CHRIST IS BORN

As Christians we await the blessed birth of the Son of God with great anticipation. In the miracle of the Birth of Christ our Lord we envision the horizon beyond time and space. It is in the birth of Christ our Lord that we are able to be reborn spiritually.

Man very often experiences weaknesses and temptation in his journey towards God. The Birth of our Lord and Savior enables us to envision the light that shines on the path of Emmaus. It is this light that transfigures the life of mankind, reinstating our life once again in the path towards God.

One of the contemporary Christian writers Henry J. M. Newman inspires us with a wonderful spiritual reflection as he speaks about the search of God that explains the true meaning of spiritual rebirth in Christ. "So I say to you, seek God and discover Him and make Him a power in your life. Without Him all of our efforts turn to ashes and our sunrises into darkest nights. Without him, life is a meaningless drama with the decisive scenes missing. But with Him we are able to rise from the fatigue of despair to the buoyancy of hope. With Him we are able to rise from the midnight of desperation to the daybreak of joy. St. Augustine was right – "We were made for God and we will be restless until we find rest in Him."

For us Christians, the birth of Christ is the greatest miracle and the source of spiritual strength. Within the vast universe God is the source of inspiration for all mankind. In the incarnation of Jesus Christ, God descends from heaven to transform the souls of men and to deliver them from the perils of darkness, leading them to Himself in a spiritual journey and making men pacemakers and role models for the good life. This man, the creature of God, emanates the light of the Creator.

Our world is confronted with numerous challenges. Under the watchful eye of God we are able to achieve new accomplishments. Yet human suffering, hunger and thirst, both physical and spiritual prevail and the perils of darkness increase. The birth of Christ is the divine Grace that awakens in us the consciousness to walk with Him and to live the life that the Disciples of Christ and the saints of the Church lived. Faith in the Son of God will make it possible for Christ to be born within us.

The late Catholicos of All Armenians Karekin I of blessed memory says: "They are not saints who refrain from entering life for fear of encountering evil.... They are not saints who remain in their individual isolation, motionless and idle, and reduce their lives, with the emptiness of their souls, to a desert where marshes do not exist because there is no water at all.... What saintliness is there in those hands that never touch life? While on the contrary, what sacred charm emanates from those hands that though are dipped sometimes in the mire of life but do not get soiled; they come out purified and more beautiful."

The Birth of Christ becomes the blessing for spiritual joy only when we as Christians, the Church and the community of the faithful, make sanctity the purpose and mission of our lives. Our world thirsts for spiritual rebirth. Our ancestors have bequeathed us to uphold their legacy and to continue to live in God, led by the light that emanates from the Gospels; to stay in communion with our ancestors whose sacrifices for their Christian faith inspires us to live our life of faith anchored on the rock of Holy Etchmiadzin.

Let your hearts become the City of Bethlehem where Christ will be reborn. I urge you to enrich your new life with new commitments and vows, making the service of God the path of your lives. Let us strengthen our Diocese with unified efforts, with our many churches, schools, and national institutions, which are gifts from above and bridges that lead

us to God. Let us greet one another with warm hearts, enriched with the mystery of Christ's Birth and with the love to transfigure our God-given lives.

Today the Holy Spirit rests upon Charles, Robert, Thomas, Abel, Melissa, Richard, Patricia, Ruth, Maria, Sarah, Andrew, Neil, Richard and Mary and enriches them with divine wisdom to lead their God-entrusted flocks and fulfill their duties and responsibilities with prudence and with the light emanating from the life of Christ our Lord. Filled with the power of the Spirit and armed with the light of Christ you are called to become prophets for your flocks. Prophets are those who bear the light and the wisdom of the Almighty God, the Creator of the Universe. Prophets are those who are able to enlighten the spiritual lives of mankind with sanctity and with the vision of the new dawn. Prophets are those who through their prayerful life are able to become the golden bridge between God an humanity.

The life-giving and inspiring words of the Psalmist will

instill a new spirit in your being: "Vindicate me, O God, and plead my cause against an ungodly nation; Oh, deliver me from the deceitful and unjust man! For You are the God of my strength; Why do You cast me off? Why do I go mourning because of the oppression of the enemy? Oh, send out Your light and Your truth! Let them lead me; Let them bring me to Your holy hill And to Your tabernacle. Then I will go to the altar of God, To God my exceeding joy; and on the harp I will praise You, O God, my God. Why are you cast down, O my soul? And why are you disquieted within me? Hope in God; for I shall yet praise Him, The help of my countenance and my God." Psalm 43

My dear fellow brothers and sisters in Christ, today, with the ordination into the priesthood, you are entering through the doorway of a New Life. I firmly believe that led with the power of the Holy Spirit the priest becomes the spiritual transformer of human lives in the life of the community, the source of true joy, and the inspiration through the services rendered to the members of the community, but above all, the messenger of the Good News, which will be attained by the people only when we live the messages of the Gospels:

"Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near. Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. Finally, beloved, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things. Keep on doing the things that you have learned and received and heard and seen in me, and the God of peace will be with you." (Philippians 4:4-9)

Christ our Lord is the good shepherd. Christ remains to be the spiritual strength for all priests who are called to serve God and humanity. A priest's life cannot be different than the pattern of the life of our Lord: a life of service, a sacrificial life reflected in sufferings, a renewed life in the victorious resurrection of Christ. In as much as the ordination of our beloved brothers and sisters into the priesthood leads them into a New Life, today we all become partakers in the spirit of renewal. I firmly believe that ordinations also transform the life of Christ's church. With the ordination of our brothers and sisters the Church is strengthened in her mission and the name of God is praised and glorified.

My Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

You are called to live your lives with Christ and thus you are given the gift of the spirit. Remember the words of our Lord, addressed to you and us all.

"If I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have given you an example that you also should do as I have done to you." (John 13:14-15)

St. Paul, the apostle, the illuminator of the souls and the minds of the pagans gave his burning and passionate love to the first Christians and through his martyrdom the same message of love penetrated into the hearts of the followers: "I have neither silver nor gold, but I give you what I have." (Acts 3:6).

Priesthood is a journey of a unique life. Alongside during on our journey God is with us and is holding us high. A priest's spiritual journey is the most joyous and rewarding life. The priest is the life-giving spiritual presence, who is called to be an icon of Christ making real God's presence in the assembly of (His) people. During the journey you are all challenged with countless tribulations and temptations. In Christ alone we will endure them and strengthen our calling and commitment in the service of humanity with holiness.

Today we are witnessing in the hearts of our priesthoodcandidates the miracle of change. You are changed to listen to God's call. You are changed to enlighten the life of the faithful. You are changed to create and become co-creators to God. This change flares up in your being only where we learn to pray with Christ our Lord. Priests also need the prayers of their people, as Karl Rahner said it rightfully –

"So, my dear friends,
Pray for him, carry him,
So that he might be able
To sustain others
By bringing to them
The mystery of God's love
Revealed in Jesus Christ."

In closing I would like to thank His Grace Bishop John Bruno, Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Los Angeles, for providing me with this honor to be the humble preacher on the historic occasion of the ordination of fifteen candidates into the order of the priesthood. Bishop Jon Bruno has been an outstanding religious leader in the ecumenical family, a great friend of all with a heart full of outpouring love and compassion, and above all with the unifying spiritual strength in all movements. Today I congratulate you, my dear brother in Christ, on this blessed occasion of the ordination of your deacons into the priesthood. I also would like to extend my special greetings to the presiding bishop of the Episcopalian Diocese, The Most Rev. Frank T., Griswold, presiding bishop of the Episcopal Church.

It is a fact that the relationship between our two churches, the Armenian Apostolic Church and the Episcopal Church, has been strong and cordial. Your recent trip to Armenia and the Mother See of Holy Etchmiadzin is also a reflection of the long-standing fellowship between the two churches. My dear brothers and sisters in Christ, dear and distinguished religious leaders and faithful, this day will be earmarked in the history of the religious community with true joy and inspiration, as we witness the ordination of the fourteen deacons into the order of the priesthood. CELEBRATING THE RENEWAL OF OUR CHRISTIAN SPIRITUALITY

Today's reception has become a tradition in the life of this Diocese, and is now expanding to the other parts of the Diocese as well. We are truly happy and thankful for the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Central area for taking this initiative in hosting the event for the 3rd time since my election as Primate of the Western Diocese.

The goal of this fellowship is threefold. The primary goal is to celebrate the renewal of our Christian spirituality with the birth of Christ our Lord. Second, to evaluate the past year's missions and projects of this Diocese, but above all to foresee the future of this Diocese.

My dear brothers and sisters in Christ, Christ our Lord continues to be the foundation of our God-given lives. Our Christian faith is once again strengthened through this fellowship. It is the time to give thanks to God for our achievements of the past year in the Western Diocese. It will be literally impossible to enumerate the countless activities all of which are aimed towards strengthening the foundations of the Armenian Apostolic Church on this blessed soil of America. Our success was possible with the equal participation of the pastors, members of the Diocesan Council, and all those faithful who have worked hard and have given generously for a stronger Diocese.

However it is important to note that there is yet much to be done to be able to attain a Christian life in its fullest sense: educating our children and fulfilling our pastoral duties and responsibilities. For as human beings we will always fall short of perfection. St. Augustine has said, "God Himself is perfection, and we are only relatively perfect." Therefore our lives are a journey towards perfection. God-willing the coming year will be exciting for us all. This Diocese will expand on many levels with the recruitment of new candidates and the

assignments of new priests to communities. This mission will succeed with true devotion and with generous and substantial donations by certain individuals and institutions. The construction of the Cathedral, the vision of the Diocese and her faithful for many years, has begun to materialize. The overlaying of the façade of the Diocesan Complex with Tufa stones is already complete, and in the next few months the actual construction will also begin.

Alongside the construction of the Cathedral, many new churches are being constructed within the Western Diocese: St. Gregory Church in Pasadena, St. John Garabed in Hollywood, Phoenix, Scottsdale, Palm Desert and Seattle.

Many church communities have acquired new properties and have launched plans for location to new and larger facilities. These parishes include San Diego, Arizona, and Las Vegas.

In the realm of expansion within the past two years a series of our newly established parishes have already begun to celebrate Divine Liturgy on a regular basis, including Burbank, Whittier, La Canada and Santa Clarita.

Religious education has taken new flight on a variety of levels. The Christian Education Council has undertaken the enhancement of our Sunday school curriculum. We have been able to reach a large number of faithful through religious education. Over 40 books have been published in the past three years and over 50 publications have been planned for the next two years. These are not merely words, but facts.

The subcommittees of the Western Diocese are working with exceptional devotion for the progress of their missions. They include the ACYO, the Ladies' Auxiliary, the Stewardship Committee, the Cathedral Committee, and many others. Some have already established new missions of their own. It is impossible to give a detailed account of the extent of our activities.

My dear faithful in Christ, I thank God for this fellowship and once again I commit myself to the service of this Diocese. I cherish the words of St. Paul "For me to live is Christ." Continue to live your God-given life with the faith of our forefathers. Continue to uphold the traditions of the Armenian Apostolic Church. But above all reflect in your lives compassion and patience for the Armenian Apostolic Church, which during the past 100 years has traversed many turbulent years. We realize that the needs awaiting us are immense. We also realize that we have the obligation to respond to the many and countless issues challenging us. All of these will be addressed with true faith, genuine love, mutual understanding between the faithful of the Armenian Apostolic Church, but above all with patience.

Patience is a virtue. Remember well the words of Martin Luther King, Jr. as he addressed his people, "I may not be able to see the peak of the mountain, but my children surely will."

All issues pertaining to our church, whether liturgical, linguistic or other, will eventually be solved gradually. Certain issues will be addressed by the Synod of Bishops, however other issues will be addressed by the people themselves. Again, remember the words of Martin Luther King, Jr. "It is not what the world is doing for the African American, but what the African Americans are doing for their people."

Exciting times are ahead of us. It is rejuvenating and spiritually uplifting to witness the genuine interest of our people for change. Change does not happen with language alone. Change does not happen with the shortening of services. Change comes from the heart. Change comes when we partake and put our hands in the work of creating a new church.

Therefore I leave you all my love, my deep and sincere respect, but above all my willingness to always be there in your service for the Mother See of Holy Etchmiadzin and for the glory of God.

SERVICE IS THE RADIANCE OF THE LIFE OF CHRIST

The New Year which begins with the Birth of Christ is a miraculous blessing and a challenge in the full sense of the word, to a New Life.

Dear children of the Armenian Apostolic Church, we feel a moral duty to share with you our contemplations on the threshold of the New Year, with a brief glance into our spiritual service during the past three years, in which you all have a part. Furthermore, we feel the need to share with you our vision and plans for the future, so that the Western Diocese of the Armenian Church prospers in her missions and becomes the foremost institution from the altars of which we preach the Gospel of Christ, the testimony of our forefathers, the lessons and messages that enlighten our present, the traditions of the Armenian Christian family, love towards our Mother Language, respect towards Armenian history, with the consciousness and fear of God to live our God-given life with utmost wisdom.

Since our election in 2003 we embarked upon the demanding journey that was entrusted to us, with the help and support of the clergy, Diocesan Council, parishes, Ladies' Auxiliary, ACYO, benefactors and the faithful.

We wish to point out only the main aspects which were particularly noticeable within the life of the Diocesan life: administrative delegations, appointment of clergy, religious missions, the establishment of new parishes, a continuous effort to raise funds for the Mother Cathedral, and a reorganization of official and ecumenical relations. We have provided detailed accounts of all these activities on a daily basis, both through the Mother Church newsletter and other forms of media. When we take a retrospective look upon what has been accomplished, we see more clearly that the field of service before us has expanded even further and that the

main points of focus lying before us for the upcoming year will be the following:

To prepare and train a large number of clergy, obtain permanent sites for our new parishes, the administrative reorganization of our Diocesan offices, the intensification of the spiritual and prayerful life on all levels, the expansion of new missions including the prison ministry and hospital visitations, the strengthening of the youth, and a closer and permanent relationship with the Mother See of Holy Etchmiadzin.

Glory to God for all the graces granted to us. Today we extend our warm words of appreciation to those individuals who have graced us with their service in the Diocesan Council for the past 25 years, who although have been acknowledged individually, have never been given the honor of a collective acknowledgement. We wish to mention the names of each of them so that together we may congratulate them for their service at the completion of this address with heartfelt applause. If the Diocese today has a character and identity, it is thanks to the clergy and members of the Diocesan Council who have served under the leadership of the former Primates. It is our heartfelt prayer that by the will of God you continue your service towards the Armenian Apostolic Church.

We wish to particularly remember also those who have served on the Diocesan Council but are no longer with us. We would like to emphasize that we have declared the year 2006 as the Year of Service so that we all dedicate ourselves to the prosperity of the Diocese. We extend our gratitude to the clergy of the Diocese serve who collectively, with the condition that one is for all and all is for one. We must endure, so that the spirit of collective service takes new flight and we may pull our parishes out of isolation and into an inter-community life.

Let us all live our God-given life with faith and prayer and turn the spirit of dedication into the symbol of our lives. Glory to a life that has become meaningful with the faith of our forefathers; glory to God for your love and blessed presence.

CHRIST IS RISEN FROM THE DEAD

"He is not here, but is risen!" (Luke 24:4)

"And you are the witness of these things." (Luke 24:48)

The good news of the Miraculous Resurrection of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ once again reaches us all as a beacon of light, as a call to the entire world towards faith and a new spiritual life; "And you are the witnesses of these things." Truly the Feast of the Resurrection of Christ not only reawakens within our spirituality the consciousness to relive the mystery of the Divine Resurrection, but even more so, to become the witnesses of the life of Christ and especially His Resurrection. The Resurrection of Christ is the ultimate reality that adorns our human spirit, because as Paul the Apostle says, "If Christ has not risen, your faith is futile." (I Corinthians 15:15).

"He is not here, but is risen!" (Luke 24:4) "And you are the witnesses of these things" (Luke 24:48). For the Armenian Christian, the Feast of the Resurrection is the feast of a "greater life." Through our sacred religious rites the fundamental truth that the Resurrection of Christ is the new dawn of our spiritual life is further rooted within us, since "through his Resurrection he transcended sin, and all that having to do with this death." Thus, the Feast of the Resurrection of Christ becomes true on the day, when not only our creed is rerooted, but above all when we become the witnesses of His Resurrection. This is precisely where emphasis is placed upon the Church. The Church, as the congregation of the Believers of Christ, as part of its presence and identify, has an obligation to speak of and peach the Resurrection of Christ; to unceasingly deliver the message of Christ's Gospels, and to make certain That the life of the Christian individual and the community is a testimony of the Resurrection of Christ. We will become the witnesses of Christ's Resurrection only when we partake in his sacrifices. In other words, when we

know how to fill our lives with sacrifice, turning our path of life towards Christ.

The miraculous Resurrection of Christ is the feast of the renewed church. The Resurrection of Christ is the dawn of a new life within every Christian. We are the ones who will construct the new church, with our own hands, so that we may give the testimony of Christ's Resurrection. Our individual life has the thirst for renewal, as is our communal life within the Church, our life of service, both national and to the Church. But, above all, our lives within the family, to raise our children entrusted to us by God, is nothing but the example of the life of Christ.

The miraculous Resurrection of Christ conveys to all of us the message to transfigure our spiritual lives through the strength of prayer and to embark upon the God-pleasing mission to cultivate our spirit. The God-pleasing mission to cultivate our spirit begins in our individual life followed by a unity of the faithful through love. The more the individual is strengthened in his life of prayer, the more passionately he testifies about the Resurrection of Christ. The more the Christian community love, the more that community becomes not only a strong testimony of the Resurrection of Christ, but above all a strong presence for all those who have strayed from the path of light and suffer in darkness. Our salvation and strength is in our spiritual life. The Church is obliged to constantly renew herself, thus becoming a presence that maintains pace with contemporary times. It is our message that the children of the Church remain firm in their Christian faith because our nation has been reborn in that faith by turning Christianity into the splendor of her spirit. For that same faith our nation has accepted the greatest divine gift, the Armenian Alphabet, and through it has eternalized the Holy Bible with Armenian words. The children of our Church, with this communion, have continued to live their God-given lives.

We have reached the point in history when even greater challenges have risen before us and now we have the obligation to overcome. We will continue to uphold, even at the cost of our lives, the legacy of our forefathers, who have been sanctified through their martyrdom. The legacy of our Christian faith and doctrine, the Motherland and Holy Etchmiadzin, our language, our national heritage, culture, history, and most importantly our right for the recognition of the Genocide. The Armenian Church will be demolished when we are not able to pass these messages on to our youth.

The Christian faith cannot be anchored upon the testimony of the Resurrection of Christ if it is not rooted in our Motherland, Holy Etchmiadzin, as well as the sacred Armenian legacies, culture and history. These facets present themselves as a cornerstone of the Christian faith. In other words, they are God-given graces which strengthen our faith. They are graces in the sense of challenges, as to what extent we are able to live our Christian faith through our actions in order that we may become partakers in the crucifixion of Christ and to gain the right to testify about the Resurrection of Christ. The mystery of the Resurrection of Christ truly becomes a testimony when the Resurrection of Christ is expressed through our lives.

Dear faithful live the Feast of the Resurrection because its mystery is the mystery of the true life. This leads us to live life striving for perfection, as Christ himself says "...be perfect, as your Heavenly Father is perfect." The Feast of Resurrection is a day of pilgrimage. It is the doorway to eternal life. It is the feast of our renewed life. It is the breath of peace and the spring, which plant harmonious brotherhood among nations. It is the Feast of Holy Etchmiadzin and, finally, the day of the victory of the Christian faith.

As sons and daughters of the Armenian nation and the Church, we will get to the Promised Land only with a committed heart, with the vision to uphold the faith of our forefathers, with the vision to embrace justice, with the undying hope and love for our culture and history, with the vision of excellence in our academic life, with the zeal to become leaders of the world, leaders in the political and spiritual lives of world's nations. Our voice will be heard only when we are strong in our fight, committed in our love for another, and firm in our Christian faith. God has graced us all with the Independent Armenia. The Church and the nation will only conquer when new stars are born in all domains of humanity, who will not only bring pride to the

nation, but will also inspire the new generations with the Armenian spirit.

As a spiritual leader and as a servant of God and my nation, I renew my calling to bring justice to the victims of the Genocide and I invite you all to make the vow to pass on the torch to your peers and the future youth to come.

Ninety-one years ago, the Ottoman Turks massacred a million and a half Armenians. Their memory is commemorated today. Decades ago, Martin Luther King Jr., in addressing to his own people challenged us all with the following words:

"I am aware of current events. I know everything you are telling me about what the white man is doing to the Negro. Now tell me: what is Negro doing for himself?"

Therefore, my dear youth, in the name of the martyrs I address you. Strengthened with your presence, I commit myself to the Armenian Question and call on you all to continue to live as good citizens of this blessed country and be the guardians of the Christian faith and the Armenian identity always remembering the words of the English historian Toynbee: "The agony of the Armenian Genocide does not lack any evidence and distortions."

CHURCH UNITY BEFORE 2050

"The quest for unity drove me (as it has so many others) closer to the source of our faith: Jesus Christ, His Gospel and the constitutive tradition of His Church. As you draw closer to that source, the vision of Christian unity strikes you with great clarity..."

These most inspiring words reflect the faith, life and the vision of a distinguished church leader who for so many decades dedicated his life to the unity of the Church, firmly believed in the commitment to that cause, and inspired many with the same zeal. Throughout his life the late Catholicos Karekin I had been engaged in numerous ecumenical movements. During his training as a priest, and later as an ordained priest of the Armenian Apostolic Church, he was actively engaged in the ecumenical movement on an international level. With his own words the ecumenical movement and meetings have become the impact for the "profound conviction that the cause of Christian unity was inseparably linked with the renewal for the Church."

As a servant of Christ I have always admired him, his ministry, and leadership in the ecumenical circles. For the past three decades, having been involved in the ecumenical life myself, mostly in the United Kingdom during my academic years at the University of Oxford, later a pastor and spiritual leader of the Armenian Church in Canada, and presently in the United States, at the Western Diocese, I continue to cherish the same spirit with the same conviction and the vision of being able to foresee that it is only through mutual understanding, respectable dialogue, and true Christian love that churches can grow as one body.

Therefore, to my understanding we can only achieve the unity of the Church in the coming decades when we have already embraced that vision in our lives. We cannot separate preaching from practice. Preaching the Word of God should

be deeply rooted in our daily actions and reflected in our relationship with our faithful and through our unconditional love, care and compassion for our brothers and sisters. It is not permissible for a Christian to say: "I can pray for you, but not with you." The unity of the church is born in the fellowship of a prayerful life. Unity is attained only when the members of the church of Christ are able to grasp the significance of praying together, thus realizing the unity of the church.

The message of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ sets forth a direction for us all, which we should all adopt, follow and fulfill. "Go, therefore and make disciples of the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you," (Mathew 28). Any move that threatens the unity of the Church should be addressed properly; especially in this age when Christianity is challenged every hour by such popular books as "The Da Vinci Code". The Gospel should always remain for us the unifying force and strength as the sons and daughters of Christ's Church. And all those who follow the messages of Christ our Lord should differentiate between the principles of the Christian faith from the interpretations of the Christian faith.

In my presentation, I will focus on the message of Christ, our Lord, which in itself reflects His life and ministry of presence. I will then make a short retrospective review of the history of Christianity, and finally focus on the challenges of today which threaten the foundations of Christianity.

I. The Message of Christ, our Lord

As Christians we all have the noble obligation to learn about the life of Christ, and His Divine presence in the life of humanity through the Incarnation. We all are called to live a Christian life in following and fulfilling the requirements put forth for the cultivation of our Christian character. Christianity is not merely a philosophy. Christianity is the way of life, which became the calling and the vocation of the Fathers of the church, who gave their lives as martyrs with the vision

and the understanding that the Incarnation of Christ, our Lord, has paved the way for us all to find our way to God. Our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ lived a very humble life. As the Son of God, He was approachable to all. He lived a holy life and inspired his Disciples and the people surrounding Him to live a similar life. He preached the Word of God and invited His Disciples to become the vessels of the Word of God. He preached in parables to make His messages more comprehensible, with images taken from daily life, thus making His Parables the mirror of life.

The late Archbishop of Canterbury Michael Ramsey an astounding religious figure, who has transfigured the hearts, souls and minds of thousands with his exemplary Christian way of life, has left us all an important legacy: how to be a Christian.

In his own words, "To be a Christian does not mean to be 'on the side of' Christianity, like one who supports a movement or approves a cause. It means the submission of self to Christ, and the sharing in the life of His family.

Christ is the vine, and you are one of the branches. Holy Communion, prayer, and the Bible are ways in which Christ can keep you united to Him; and these are wonderful gifts, involving stupendous demands. You cannot bypass the Church; you are part of its scandal, unless you are setting yourself to be part of its glory."

This reflection in itself gives us a deeper understanding of Michael Ramsey's perception of the Christian faith, whose vision for the unity of the Church has left a great impact during the 60's and 70's, and he, himself, became one of the spiritual components of the ecumenical life and facilitated many new bridges between East and West and amongst all Christian churches. His perception of the unity of Christ's church was the result of his true Christian identity. He firmly believed in Christianity. He was not "on the side of" Christianity. He was source of the movement within the Church. He humbled for Christ, became one in Christ, and invited others to be followers of his credo.

Much could be said about Christ and Christianity. However the most important aspect to take into consideration is the notion of change. Christ came to this world to change lives, He transfigured in order that we may transfigure our spirituality. With this in mind, all other factors that threaten the unity of Christ's Church should be eliminated with wisdom, with the love of Christ, and with our faith in God.

To my understanding those who do not learn and practice the Christian faith in their everyday lives, are more inclined to be engaged in issues deviating from the spirit of the Gospels and the messages of Christ, our Lord. Christianity is the living faith. For 2000 years, generations have enriched their spirituality by nourishing their souls, minds, and spirits with the life of Christ and the messages emanating from the Gospels. Christianity should become the spiritual bread of life. We know well the importance of bread for the sustenance of our physical body, which gives the necessary strength to live. The same also applies to spiritual nourishment. Through our baptism, we are challenged to live with the vision of a life in Christ, a life with our fellow brothers and sisters in Christ, a life becoming a part of Christ's church.

Therefore one cannot possibly have the vision of unity for the coming decades without living a Christian life, without inspiring others to live a Christian life, without having the vision to become a spiritual tool for the unity for Christ's Church

II. Retrospective Reflections on the History of Christianity.

Throughout history, Christianity has been challenged by countless circumstances, be it political, social, and above all theological. One cannot separate these circumstances. All theological arguments are somehow influenced by sociopolitical approaches. As we look into the history of Christianity we realize that with ongoing conflicts and intense struggles between communities, Christianity has paved the way for other religions to grow. If only we listen to the Word of Christ our Lord, "I am the Way, the Truth and the Life," then

we would learn to be more careful, distancing our lives from circumstances, which not only weaken, but also threaten the foundations of the Christian Church. The first ecumenical councils, those of Nicaea, Constantinople, and Ephesus, clearly defined the credo, our faith in God. The more I have studied the history of Christianity, the closer I have been drawn to the Gospels.

When we look closely at the history of Christianity, we realize that philosophical approaches have always been traps for unforeseen arguments. Therefore seminars and conferences as such are important tools to reawaken in us the Christian spirit, the presence of Christ, and the commitment to live as Christians.

"The trend toward ecumenism has been a part and parcel of the church from its very beginning. In the deeply spiritual, extremely moving and tremendously challenging seventeenth chapter of the Gospel of St. John, we see its true source in one of Christ's most moving prayers. In that passage, Jesus prays that His followers (in the first place the apostles themselves) may all be one..." (Catholicos Karekin I).

III. The Challenges of Today

"Today it is not the form of the faith that is in question. Today faith itself is at stake... the universality of the Christian faith is an intrinsic part of its nature. The ecumenical movement is our endeavor to bring that universality to life through the unity of our church." (Catholicos Karekin I)

We live in the most challenging of times. The world in which we live poses a threat against the Christian faith. We are either engulfed in the flames posed by these threats, or we are adamant to respond and fight against all challenges, which depict the Christian faith as a dysfunctional religion.

In my final remarks, I urge all of us to be more united in our efforts to fight against all challenges, which describe the Christian faith as a dysfunctional religion. It is important to seek the reasons as to why the Christian religion is being uprooted in the communities we live in. First, personal witnessing is important in our communal life of faith. If we are not able to make our lives the refection of Christ's love, if we are not able to create a Christian community, if we are not able to pursue Christian morals, if we are not able to become the torchbearers of our forefathers' faith and be the witnesses of Christ's life, then Christianity becomes solely a movement and the community is deprived of a strong sense of commitment.

I believe that true respect and genuine love between churches is the key element of success in achieving the long awaited unity. My answer to the question "Unity before 2050?" is positive. I do have the vision for a united church. I consider myself being part of the same church and I call on you all to have the same vision. Christianity is not a science. Christianity is a way of life, Christian unity is achieved only when we live as Christians, when we walk with Christ and become partakers in his sufferings, and ultimately in his Blessed Resurrection. Those who live with Christ and in Christ can certainly be the uniting spiritual strength and the force to expedite the unity of the Christian Church.

Christianity has the moral obligation to focus on the life of society, thus influencing the change in society's life. Christianity has the obligation to transform people's lives. As Christ's church the more we are focused on this aspect, the more we are united in Christ. A Church which has deprived herself from this type of important position is certainly divided within herself.

The late Archbishop of Canterbury, Michael Ramsey, challenged us with his profound thoughts about the ultimate role of Christ's church. "The Church is pledged to influence society and to criticize society. In this task the deepest influence should always be upon persons on their character as persons. Christ himself lived and died and rose again in a world full of social abuses, including appalling abuse of slavery. But Christ's chief method was not to attack institutions, but to transform people. And there can be no substitute for the impact of Christianity upon people at their deepest

level, always remembering that a person never lives in a vacuum; he is always a bundle of social relationships, both private and public. And these relationships all need to be Christianized. So the church's mission to change personal lives cannot be separated from its critique of wrong attitudes in society."

Therefore, I highly commend the efforts of the "Orientale Lumen Conferences" for what you do for the Christian community, thus facilitating new means for the members of Christ's Church to get to know one another better and to be engaged in fellowship, for the sake of the unity of Christ's Church.

THE JOURNEY OF TRANSFORMATION

"When we join the church, we are not joining an 'organization'; we are embarking on a journey of transformation."

Transformation – for a Christian who perceives his/her God-given life to be the most precious gift, the transformation of the inner soul is a necessity. If we are not careful to cultivate our spirituality then we lose the true meaning of life. Life itself should constantly renew itself with the knowledge of God, which in turn ought to be reflected in our relationship with fellow friends, amongst the members of the family, and vis-à-vis to all. I can attest to that in my own life, for I have met individuals, be they men of the clerk or of any other profession, who have inspired me by the strength of their faith, but above all, through their affirmation that the Church calls on us all to embrace a unique journey of transformation. Transformation for the human soul takes place when prayer mirrors our life.

"Ultimately, (though) there comes a time when we should unplug and actually talk to each other old-fashion style, face-to-face, uninterrupted by e-mail or cell phones or iPods because without real human interaction, technology isn't worth much." Theres I. Borchard

We all live in an age where technology not only dominates our spirituality, but it actually threatens or normal relationship with God and friends. Technology should be used to the extent that it brings us closer to each other, without interrupting human interaction.

The Church is the place, which remains and continues to be the spiritual strength for all humanity to bond with and ultimately embrace God as family. As I watch and follow the devastating news in the Middle East, there I see not only the lack of Christian love, but also the abuse of technology, which distances people from each other. When we meet and talk, we are able to see that we are equal in the eyes of God and thus have responsibility to have mutual respect for one another. In the same way we surrender ourselves to God with total trust, we also need to embrace one another and surrender ourselves to each other with respect, but above all with the fear of God

We are all born to be the spiritual architects of our Godgiven lives. We embrace this honor of becoming spiritual architects if only we are able to turn our belief into an active form through "prayer, self-analysis, and directed religious energy, which helps people to gain control of their own lives."

A reinvigoration of the search of God should ultimately be the destiny of all Christians.

CLAREMONT SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY ECUMENICAL SERVICE

Life is God's greatest gift. It is the breath of God in us. We should each live our lives in such a manner as if it is God who is speaking through us. Life is given to us so that we may offer it to God and to mankind for peace. Very often we fail, personally and collectively, to dedicate our lives, the very gift of God, to Him, and He constantly intervenes in various ways to bid us to renew our calling and to renew our course of life.

This has been the psychological state of the mind, soul and heart of humanity in all times. Therefore it is obvious that the human being has been the strongest responder to all challenges in all times, if only God has been the stronghold of his life. I say this with the good faith as the Fathers of the church teach us also, that as we are created in the image of God, we are able to create a new world to overcome all challenges, and be the guardians of the God-created world.

I am delighted to be here today to address the students of theology. I know that we don't all share the same faith, but it is God that unites us all. Although we don't necessarily share the same history, traditions and culture, however having respect for one other makes us spiritually richer.

Today I am given the chance to give my personal testimony and the testimony of a nation which has accepted Christianity as a way of life and with pride we share our experiences with our brothers and sisters. I come from the tradition of the Armenian Apostolic Church, which has recently celebrated the 1700th anniversary of the acceptance of Christianity as a state religion. Throughout history, we have lived a life similar to that of Christ. As we have experienced suffering we have understood that we have become participants of the suffering of Christ our Lord, thus never losing the vision of the Resurrection.

As I address you, the students of the University, I would like to convey my love and respect to all those who have come from different religions and backgrounds, and also invite you all to join us one day and partake in our Divine Liturgy in one of our churches to better understand the life of a nation who chose to become Christian and has survived Genocide and many shattering encounters during its history. If we have survived, it is only through our Christian faith. If we have survived, it is through our commitment to continually walk towards God in search of our identity, and in service of humanity.

As students of theology, my wish and prayer is that your years of education turn out to be instrumental in your Godgiven life. You are here to educate yourselves so that Godwilling when the day comes you will become the educators of the children of God entrusted to you. You are here to cultivate in your spirituality the Pastor of tomorrow to one day become the shepherds for the sheep who have lost God and have gone astray and become involved in things not pleasant to God. You are here today in this school of theology to become one with God and to illuminate in your spirituality the vision to share your God-given gifts with others, to share and experience your unconditional love with others,

and above all to make a promise to live a meaningful life. Therefore my humble message to you is that you constantly question your calling and vocation each and every day. My message to you all is that you turn this period of education into a spiritual transition, which will transform your life into an instrument of change in the life of humanity. This world can certainly be a better place when together we are able to understand our God-given vocation to guard the world in peace and prosperity.

In closing I would like to thank the Claremont School of Theology, and specifically President Dr. Philip Amerson, Rev. Dr. Soomee Kim, Rev. Dr. Emery Parcell, Rev. Marilynn Huntington, Rev. Dr. Kathy Black, and all those who have contributed to this event. I would also like to thank my two deacons Vahe Abovian and Mayis Shahbazyan, for their engagement in fellowship with this faculty.

May the Lord bless you all. May He give you the strength and the wisdom to live a meaningful life.

WHAT IS NEXT?

My dear youth,

I address you all with a warm heart and with the trust that this retreat and fellowship in Christ will be a special kind of forum for you as responsible members of the Armenian Apostolic Church who strive to continue your journey toward God.

The past almost three years that I've been in the Western Diocese, I have witnessed the many successes of our community, as well as its weaknesses. Consequently, I am challenged to serve you with a renewed calling and commitment. As we question our ability, our behavior, our doings and sayings we create a mirror for ourselves and help us correct our path, thus reinstating our journey toward God.

The good you do today, people will often forget tomorrow; Do good anyway.

Give the world the best you have, and it may never be enough; Give the world the best you've got anyway.

"CSUN" GENOCIDE MEMORIAL EVENT

"But as for you, continue in what you have learned and firmly believed, knowing from whom you have learned it and how from childhood you have been acquainted with the sacred traditions-writings which are able to instruct you for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus." 2 Timothy 3:14-15

We all are destined to be the truth tellers. Tonight's gathering sends out a powerful message to the world. The young generation of the Armenian people is challenged to carry the torch passed on to them by their forefathers.

My Dear Youth,

When the memory of the victims of the Genocide is observed and commemorated by the young generation with a deeper respect for their memory and in appreciation of their martyrdom and their sacrifice in the name of God, their Christian faith, and love of Armenia, then you become the beacon of love and a source of light for our community. The best way to bring justice is to be enriched in your academic lives, for the more you are educated and spiritually enriched, the more the Resurrection of Our Lord and nation will be evident.

Remember the words of St. Paul the Apostle "continue in what you have learned and firmly believed". Keep the legacy which you have inherited from your forefathers. They did not die in vain. They focused on Christ's message. As Our Lord instructed to His disciples who then passed on the message to us all: Do not fear those who kill the body, but cannot destroy the soul. They chose to die courageously, knowingly, and willingly with the vision that their martyred life will become a new beginning in the lives of future generations. Therefore, tonight's observance and commemoration becomes even more meaningful when we are again affirmed

in our spirituality and commitment to learn our history and language, to guard our culture and identity, but above all, to respond to the question: what is the reason of our being?

Tonight's gathering is the reflection of our faith in God and the universality of pain and suffering as the result of intended injustice to our people as well as of others.

"We are all different; because of that, each of us has something different and special to offer and each and every one of us can make a difference by not being indifferent." Henry Friedman's message enlightens our minds and souls with the vision of deep and genuine respect for all nations, for all cultures and for all religions. Friedman's message instills within our being the desire of becoming tools of peace and workers of miracles.

Tonight's commemoration and observance is a vivid expression of understanding of our history, sufferings, but above all, our rebirth. "Do not fear those who kill the body, but cannot kill the soul." Our forefathers fought for their faith and for the love of their land, but never feared as they were killed. Through their martyrdom, they exemplified the strength of their Christian faith. What Jerry Costello has once said for the Armenians, the same also applies for the Jewish people: "With faith and courage, generations of Armenians have overcome great suffering and proudly preserved their culture, traditions, and religion and have told the story of the genocide to an often indifferent world."

Good and evil coexist in this world. Both are acts of man and both are acts of choice. Tonight's commemoration and observance unites are all in fight of "Man's inhumanity towards man." Martin Luther King, an advocate of justice and peace reawakened in the nation's life a new era in his pursuance to secure respect for one another, for all nations and colors. In his words: "Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere... whatever affects one directly, affects all equally."

Whenever one talks of the Jewish Holocaust one cannot but recall the images of the gas chambers in Auschwitz and the piles and piles of lifeless bodies. Likewise, one cannot but recall the images of the endless deserts of Der Zor, the graveyard of hundreds of thousands of innocent lives.

The following passage provides a graphic description of the horrors witnessed by those who were marched through the scorching deserts:

"...ferocity of the gendarmes apparently increased as the journey lengthened, for they seemed almost to resent the fact that part of their charges continued to live. Frequently, any one who dropped on the road and bayoneted on the spot. The Armenians began to die by hundreds from hunger and thirst. Even when they came to rivers, the gendarmes, merely to torment them, would sometimes not let them drink. The hot sun of the desert burned their scantily clothed bodies, and their bare feet, treading the hot sand of the desert, became so sore that thousands fell and died or were killed where they lay. Thus, I a few days, what had been a procession of normal human beings became a stumbling horde of dust-covered skeletons, ravenously looking for scraps of food, eating any offal that came their way, crazed by the hideous sights that filled every hour of their existence, sick with all the diseases that accompany such hardships and privations, but still prodded on and on by whips and clubs and bayonets of their executioners."

As the grandson of a survivor, I have felt the pain and suffering as I first read the torturing of priests and members of my immediate family.

History can repeat itself if we are indifferent to the memory of victims of the Armenian Genocide, the Jewish Holocaust, and the Genocides in Cambodia, Rwanda, and Darfur.

We live in a blessed land. The United States of America is the beacon of liberty, a staunch defender of human rights and above all, a lighthouse for justice. We cannot rewrite history. I wish we could. We cannot reverse time and revive those who perished. We are confident that the day will come when this great country will bravely stand tall by our side in

denouncing the atrocities of 1915 and rightly acknowledge the Armenian Genocide – for what it is, a genocide with a capital G.

Yes. We live in a blessed land, which has graced as all with all the necessary tools to uphold the memories of history, thus making history the roots of our life. A life deprived from the memories, is a life emptied from responsibilities and dignities. Tonight, as much as we observe the solemn memory of the victims of the Genocide, we also pay homage to the martyrs by celebrating life after Genocide.

A NATION WHICH REFUSES TO DIE

I would like to begin my words by extending homage to the innocent lives of the Virginia Tech massacre, a horrific event which shook this nation. We pray for the departed souls of the victims and pray for their families and their loved ones.

Much could be said about the Armenian Genocide perpetrated by the Ottoman Turks. Historical facts witnessing the victims of the Armenian Genocide are well documented by world teaching scholars and preserved in all international educational institutions, universities and in countless libraries around the world. It is most comforting and spiritually uplifting to be recognized by governmental, civic offices and religious organizations as the sons and daughters of the victims of the Armenian Genocide. Today's Remembrance ceremony by the City of Los Angeles to honor the memory of those who perished in the Armenian Genocide also extends tribute to the citizens of United States of Armenian descent, who have become an integral part of American Society. Citizens of Armenian origin have proven to be loyal citizens of this freedom-loving land. Over the past many decades political leaders and activists, ecumenical leaders and intellectuals have rendered tremendous respect for the memory of the victims of the Genocide.

"So let us call Genocide, Genocide. Let us not minimize the deliberate murder or 1.5 million people. Let us have a moral victory that can shine as a light to all nations."

Stanley Cohen, Professor of Criminology, Hebrew University, Jerusalem, has made a firm statement in support of the recognition of the victims or the Armenian Genocide:

In his own words Professor Cohen says: "The nearest successful example, in the modern era is the 80 years of official denial by successive Turkish government of the 1915-17 genocide against the Armenians, in which 1.5 million people lost their lives. This denial has been sustained by deliberate

propaganda, lying and cover-ups, forgoing documents, suppression of archives, and bribing scholars." (Law and Social Inquiry, Vol. 20, No. 1 (Winter) 1995): 7,50).

Honorable President of the Los Angeles City Council, honorable city councilmembers, and distinguished guests, it is truly gratifying to witness the commemoration of the memory of the victims of the Armenian Genocide. This act alone challenges the society and our children to uphold firm in our hearts the legacy of the founders of this great nation, who put their faith in God. Our faith in God need to be reflected in civilized life in pursuance of higher education, with deepest respect for the life of our fellow citizens regardless of their cultural, religious and ethnic background.

May the Almighty God bless us all, keep us all united in our efforts to bring justice to the loss of the million and half souls, but above all, for the education of the younger generations to prevent intolerance, hatred and injustice in the life of all nations. Commemorations renew within us a new sense of responsibility for humanity. In this sense, the words of Mahatma Gandhi conveys to us all a special message: "All humanity is one undivided and indivisible family, and each one of us is responsible for the misdeeds of all the others. I cannot detach myself from the wickedest soul."

Honorable president, honorable councilmembers, distinguished guests, through today's commemoration we once again send out the message to the world that the Armenian nation refuses to die.

May the Lord bless the memory or the victims of the Armenian Genocide and strengthen us all in our calling and vocation to become the spiritual architects for a brighter future.

Henry Friedman's words alerts us all to live a responsible life, a life with dignity, a life in rendering respect for the historical truths. As the founder of the Jewish World Watch, Rabbi Harold Schulweis ponders on the shameful historical facts of Genocide, Holocaust and all other genocides, and his remarkable statements deepen within our spirits a new sense of commitment to honor the memory of the victims of the Armenian Genocide, and the Jewish Holocaust, the genocides in Darfur, Rwanda and the killing fields of Cambodia. In his words: "To choose to forget what happened to the martyrs is an insult to their memory and a danger to our children..." "Every genocide is sinful. But a kinship of suffering unites us all." The vision of Rabbi Harold Schulweis brings us all together to pay collective homage to the martyrs of the Armenian Genocide and the Jewish Holocaust. This action itself is the reflection of our faith in God and the universality of pain and suffering as the result of intended injustice to both our peoples as well as of others. "We are all different; because of that, each of us has something different and special to offer and each and every one of us can make a difference by not being indifferent." Henry Friedman's message enlightens our minds and souls with the vision of deep and genuine respect for all nations, for all cultures, for all religions in instilling within our being the desire of becoming tools of peace and workers of miracles.

Tonight's commemoration and observance is a vivid expression of mutual respect and understanding of each other's history, sufferings, but above all our rebirth. "Do not fear those who kill the body, but cannot kill the soul." Our forefathers fought for their faith and for the love of their land, but never feared as they were killed. They kept firm and solid the spirit as a gift from God and continue to enrich our lives through their martyrdom. What Jerry Costello has once said for the Armenians, the same also applies for the Jewish people: "With faith and courage, generations of Armenians have overcome great suffering and proudly preserved their culture, traditions, and religion and have told the story of the genocide to an often indifferent world."

Good and evil coexist in this world. Both are acts of man. Both are acts of choice. Tonight's commemoration and observance unites us all in our fight against "Man's inhumanity towards man." Martin Luther King, an advocate of justice and peace reawakened in the nation's life a new era in his pursuance to secure respect for one another, for all nations and colors. In his words: "Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere...whatever affects one directly, affects all equally."

Pope John Paul II in his speech at the Yad Vashem Holocaust memorial in Jerusalem, said:

"The words of the ancient Psalm rise from our hearts: "I have become like a broken vessel. I hear the whispering of many -- terror on every side -- as they scheme together

against me, as they plot to take my life. But I trust in you, O Lord: I say, 'you are my God." (Psalms 31:13-15)

"We wish to remember. But we wish to remember for a purpose, namely to ensure that never again will evil prevail, as it did for the millions of innocent victims of Nazism. How could man have such utter contempt for man? Because he had reached the point of contempt for God. Only a godless ideology could plan and carry out the extermination of a whole people.

Jews and Christians share an immense spiritual patrimony, flowing from God's self-revelation. Our religious teachings and our spiritual experience demand that we overcome evil with good. We remember, but not with any desire for vengeance or as an incentive to hatred. For us, to remember is to pray for peace and justice, and to commit ourselves to their cause. Only a world at peace, with justice for all, can avoid repeating the mistakes and terrible crimes of the past."

Whenever one talks of the Jewish Holocaust one cannot but recall the images of the gas chambers in Auschwitz and the piles and piles of lifeless bodies. Likewise, one cannot but recall the images of the endless deserts of Der Zor, the graveyard of hundreds of thousands of innocent Armenians.

The following passage provides a graphic description of the horrors witnessed by those who were marched through the endless deserts:

"The ferocity of the Turkish gendarmes apparently increased as the journey lengthened, for they seemed almost to resent the fact that part of their charges continued to live. Frequently any one who dropped on the road was bayoneted on the spot. The Armenians began to die by hundreds from hunger and thirst. Even when they came to rivers, the gendarmes, merely to torment them, would sometimes not let them drink. The hot sun of the desert burned their scantily clothed bodies, and their bare feet, treading the hot sand of the desert, became so sore that thousands fell and died or were killed where they lay. Thus, in a few days, what had

been a procession of normal human beings became a stumbling horde of dust-covered skeletons, ravenously looking for scraps of food, eating any offal that came their way, crazed by the hideous sights that filled every hour of their existence, sick with all the diseases that accompany such hardships and privations, but still prodded on and on by the whips and clubs and bayonets of their executioners.

The following is a translation of Dostoevsky's writings on the Armenian Genocide whereby he described the cruelty and perverseness of the Turk.

"At one instance, the Turk gendarmes created a game. They snatch a toddler from his shivering mother's arms and start entertaining the little child in a bid to win its attention. They succeed. They then place a loaded pistol in the little hands of the innocent being a few centimeters from his head, while the child cheerfully plays with its "new toy". Meanwhile the Turk gendarmes fervently and enthusiastically Salivate, waiting for the child to pull the trigger, blowing his little head into pieces. Only after they hear the bang, does their lust for death sink and they celebrate with utter joy for their ingenuity."

As the grandson of a survivor I have felt the pain and suffering as I first read the torturing of priests and members of my immediate families. The pain has not been less when I first visit Dachau in Germany, a place which reminds us all of a shameful act towards the Jewish people.

History can repeat itself if we are indifferent to the memory of victims of the Armenian Genocide, the Jewish Holocaust, and the genocides in Cambodia, Rwanda and Darfur. Tonight's commemoration and observance marks a new era in the life of both our communities. Rabbi Harold Schulweis words send a strong message to the world: "We dare murder Memories of Genocide."

We live in a blessed land. The United States of America is the beacon of liberty, a staunch defender of human rights and above all a lighthouse for justice. We cannot rewrite history. I wish we could. We cannot reverse time and revive those

who perished. We are confident that the day will come when this great country will bravely stand tall by our side in denouncing the atrocities of 1915 and rightly acknowledge the Armenian Genocide – for what it is, a genocide with a capital G.

Yes. We live in a blessed land, which has graced us all with all the necessary tools to uphold the memories of history, thus making history the roots of our life. A life deprived from the memories, is a life emptied from responsibilities and dignities. Tonight, as much as we observe the solemn memory of the victims of the Genocide, we also celebrate life after Genocide, life after Holocaust, to bring justice to the memory of the martyrs.

1. To facilitate open forums for all the women of the community and lead them into faithful discussions for the benefit of the Church.

- 2. To establish closer relationships with the existing bodies of the churches.
- 3. To become the hosting committee for the churches on Sundays. Our church needs to become a Church centered on service. Our church needs to expand her services beyond her walls. Our church needs to be engaged in the life of the community. The Church is not an exclusive Church. To realize this, we need your help and guidance. Above all, we need your love doubled with new members. The life of Christ our Lord remains to be the true example of service and leadership, as it reflects His unconditional love.

The words of Martin Luther King convey to us a challenging message: "Love is the most durable power in the world. This creative force, so beautifully exemplified in the life of our Christ, is the most potent instrument available in mankind's quest for peace and security."

If we exercise the grace of love within our community, we become the Living Church. I say these words with the firm belief that with you, the ladies of the Diocese, we can become the Living Church and move mountains.

Therefore, it is my request that we rethink about our mission and calling. Let us reach out to the members of our communities with new perspectives, with new methods, with a deeper love and with a renewed spirit of service. With an embracing heart and soul, we can bring all women of this Diocese into the life of the Church and entrust them with special tasks and responsibilities. The success of our mission lies in our hearts, in our frequent fellowships, in our in-depth relationship as was the case with Christ and His disciples.

In my closing remarks, I would like to thank God for the blessing of your service and love. My special thanks to the members of the Central Council, but especially to Mrs. Silva Katchiguian whose dedication and passion cannot be expressed with words alone. Her leadership in the life of the Diocese has been exceptional and exemplary.

On your behalf, I congratulate her for her accomplishment.

LOS ANGELES CITY COUNCIL COMMEMORATES ARMENIAN GENOCIDE

On April 18th, Abp. Hovnan Derderian, accompanied by a delegation from the Western Diocese, participated in the presentation of a proclamation commemorating the 93rd Anniversary of the Armenian Genocide from the Los Angeles City Council. The proclamation was presented by City Council President Eric Garcetti, and Councilwoman Wendy Gruel to clergy of the Western Diocese as well as community leaders on behalf of the Armenian Americans of Los Angeles.

The Primate in his remarks to the City Council said "The recognition of the first genocide by the L.A. City Council brings justice to the memory of the victims."

"All great things are simple, and many can be expressed in single words: freedom, justice, honor, duty, mercy, hope." Sir Winston Churchill

These are the words of Sir Winston Churchill which embody the vision of the martyrs of the first Genocide of the twentieth century. They have sacrificed their lives for freedom, justice, honor, duty, mercy and hope. They knew well that the price for their vision would be the cost of their lives. However, they chose martyrdom rather than the oppression of the soul and the denial of their spiritual and moral values. Their martyrdom as the victims of the first genocide has a special message to convey not only to the children of the Armenian nation around the world, but also to humanity as a whole.

In the grace of your benevolence we turn our eyes to the future and give thanks. As Americans of Armenian descent we have not only lived, but have also thrived in the United States for generations. The true values of this country are democracy and freedom, two principles that contribute to a God-pleasing vision of universal respect for humanity.

Freedom of faith is a gift from God, which cannot be

taken away from us forcefully; justice prevails only where we all render unconditional respect for all; honor is the reward only for those who fulfill the promise of life; duty is the conscience of guarding spiritual values; mercy should be reflected in action in our daily lives; and finally hope is the ultimate virtue which helps us better understand that dreams are realized beyond the horizon.

The recognition of the first genocide by the L.A. City Council brings justice to the memory of the victims. They are remembered in our prayers with dignity and with the promise that history will always honor their martyrdom for their courage, who gave their lives for freedom, justice, honor, duty, mercy and hope. Though they were silenced, their vision for a more prosperous future is being fulfilled by us, the surviving generation, but never failed to cherish the dream of Armenia.

Almost a century ago, the United States of America embraced the orphans and the survivors of the genocide. This blessed country has strengthened in us the renewed sense of commitment to pursue our noble cause: the recognition of the first genocide of the twentieth century. The will of God will be fulfilled. This blessed land has become home away from home for our children. Their commitment for America is firm and genuine and their love for their ancestral land of Armenia symbolizes the love for the people of God.

Our journey of life in this country will be a journey of commitments, a journey of successful achievements, and a journey of resurrection that will bring justice to the memory of the martyrs of the Armenian Genocide.

A MESSAGE FROM MONTEBELLO

My dear faithful in Christ,

On this solemn occasion, as we gather to commemorate the memory of the victims of the Genocide, I would like to begin my message by sharing a quote from Dr. Martin Luther King, a man who had the vision to see his people freed from bondage, to respect the rights of the people, and above all, to respond to God's call in his life.

"I just do God's will... I have seen the Promised Land. I may not get there with you. But I want you to know tonight that we as a people will get to the Promised Land."

There was a time when April 24th was a day of mourning in the life of our people. Today it has become a day of celebration, a day to celebrate the resurrection and rebirth of our great Armenian nation. April 24th embodies in itself a new message. The survivors of the Genocide though were orphaned, but through God's grace received the vision to become the parents of new generations who lived in the spirit of freedom and have become the architects of the new Armenia. Today we celebrate the realization of the dream of the victims of the Genocide through the accomplishments of our lives.

Today we are reading about new developments about the relations between Armenia and Turkey. At this point all we can do is pray that the route being sought by our leaders will lead to a just resolution to the Armenian cause and help us realize what we have been fighting for as a nation for decades. May God give us strength that in this, as in all things, we persevere, and remain united in our call for justice.

For our fallen ancestors, the Promised Land was Hayastan. For us, the Promised Land is the Armenian Church, and the Holy Traditions of our nation and forefathers. The sacrifice of our martyrs is the foundation of our life. Their blood is the call for constant rebirth. Their spirit is the journey and goal of our spiritual life, so that we may live with the love of God, faith in Christ while always holding firm in our hearts the vision of historic Armenia, a powerful Church, and above all, a prosperous young generation who will become the miracles of change and the future of our great Armenian nation.

THE 82ND ANNUAL DIOCESAN ASSEMBLY

Beloved delegates of the 82nd Annual Diocesan Assembly, Dearest pastors of the Western Diocese and representatives of our parishes,

We give thanks to God Almighty for granting us the strength and the guidance of the Holy Spirit to serve the Armenian Apostolic Church throughout the past three decades.

During the past six years, we had the privilege to serve the faithful of the Western Diocese of the Armenian Church. Throughout the past decades, this Diocese was blessed by the service of seven primates, many clergymen and thousands of faithful who have firmly upheld the holy traditions of our church and our forefathers. We are humbled beyond measure and grateful for their unyielding service and commitment to this Diocese.

We also take this opportunity to pray for the departed souls of our deceased primates, clergymen and lay servants of Christ. We would also like to raise our prayers for all of our current volunteers and members who continue to serve this Diocese and support its many programs and projects. The time and effort you all provide is immeasurable and for that, we are extremely grateful.

Today as we start a new era of service, our souls are filled with one of the messages of St. Paul to the Corinthians whereby we pledge to serve this holy mission entrusted to us with more zeal and a strengthened faith in praise of our Lord.

Throughout the past six years, we were able to serve with the blessing of God Almighty and your collective dedication. Together, we have accomplished a great number of projects and have enriched the Diocese with many new programs. In the following section, we would like to lay out some of these key achievements.

Major achievements during the period 2003-2009:

- 1. Preparation of 14 new clergy candidates, of which 4 were ordained as married priests.
- 2. A new group of clergymen now serving at the Diocese with various assignments.
- 3. Establishment of new parishes and appointment of new priests.
- 4. The publication of more than 130 different periodicals and books.
- 5. The acquisition of new properties in various cities and regions. These properties are already being remodeled to serve as churches for many of our communities.
- 6. The construction of new sanctuaries has and will continue to be an integral part of the expansion of this Diocese. The construction of the Mother Cathedral, the Church building of St. Gregory in Pasadena, the church building in Portland, St. Apkar in Arizona and St. Garabed in the Desert mark the beginning of an era of new Armenian Churches that will enrich our Diocese and create houses of worship to our large and disbursed community throughout the Western United States.
- 7. We have also been actively engaged and participated in ecumenical fellowships and interfaith gatherings in Southern California, as well as in other areas of the Diocese. We would like to take this opportunity to thank each and every member of the staff of the Western Diocese all of whom serve their entrusted duties with utmost dedication and commitment.

We would also like to highlight and acknowledge the important work being done by all of the subcommittees of the Diocese whose members take on the responsibility to advance the mission of their respective programs.

We are aware that all of our endeavors are short of perfection, as perfection can only be attributed to God Almighty. On the contrary, we will continue to serve with the recognition that much needs to be achieved as we embark on this new era of service. My dear faithful, the past six years

were just the beginning, as we spent time to learn about the Diocese, and the spiritual needs of the community. Our mission at the Western Diocese requires us to meet the needs of a very large community. Therefore, we would like to lay out a number of steps we have to take as we prepare to bring our Diocese to a new level of service as we prepare to meet the growing needs of our communities.

Step 1: In Search of God:

The search of God in our spiritual life should be one of the essential elements of the individual and community life. As Reverend Doctor Martin Luther King said: "So I say to you, seek God and discover Him and make Him a power in your life Without Him, all of our efforts turn into ashes and our sunrises into darkest nights. Without Him, life is a meaningless drama with the decisive scenes missing. But with Him we are able to rise from the midnight of desperation to the daybreak of joy. St. Augustine was right - we were made for God and we will be restless until we find rest in Him."

Saturday and Sunday Armenian schools as well as the ACYO are the most fertile grounds in which we can cultivate the minds and souls of our precious youth. Educating the youth with the messages of the Gospel of Christ, our Lord is primary in our spiritual mission.

Step 2: The training of new priests:

The Stewardship program has been a great success and has devoted its time and effort in preparing young candidates for the priesthood. Last year, we witnessed the fruits of this program with the ordination of four married priests. This committee meets regularly and follows an agenda to secure the necessary funding and guidance for the candidates and newly ordained priests.

We call on you our beloved parishioners to become shareholders in this critically important mission to secure continuity and smooth transition throughout our parish network.

In addition to the training of the priests, we will be

establishing a special curriculum for the continued education for all practicing priests to refresh their training as well as to introduce them to methods aimed at better executing their pastoral duties.

We will also be establishing in-house training for potential candidates. These classes will serve as a transition before joining St. Nersess Seminary.

Step 3: Reorganization of Parishes and Dues Paying Memberships:

We need to acknowledge the fact that the structure of our parishes and the participation of our faithful in the membership drive require much attention and renewed focus. In the coming months and years this issue will be addressed properly and measures will be taken to formalize the concept of membership and the structure of a parish. We will also work with the parishes to clarify and redefine the geographic boundaries of our present parishes and the communities, which they serve.

Moreover, the most critical element in the life of the community will continue to be the praising and love of God Almighty.

Martin Luther King's definition of love inspires us tremendously. King said the following:

"Love is the most durable power in the world. This creative force, so beautifully exemplified in the life of our Christ, is the most potent instrument available in mankind's quest for peace and security."

Step 4: The reorganization of the Diocesan Administration:

In response to the increased volume of creativity within the mission of the Western Diocese these past six years, there will be a reorganization of the Diocesan administration beginning on May 4th, 2009. All positions and titles will be reviewed in the course of the coming six months to better meet the evolving needs of the Diocese and the community, and a number of departments will be relocated to the new offices in the Cathedral structure.

Step 5: The Mother Cathedral and the construction of new churches:

While the construction of the Mother Cathedral will be completed next year, the development of new churches within the Diocese will continue with the purchase of new properties. We anticipate the completion of the Mother Cathedral by April-May 2010. God willing, the consecration of the Mother Cathedral will take place, in September 2010 by His Holiness Karekin II, Supreme Patriarch and Catholicos of all Armenians.

Step 6: Establishment of Mission Parishes Desk:

It is our goal to establish a new department that will be in charge of following up and managing the affairs of the so-called Mission Parishes of the Diocese. The responsibilities of the Mission Parishes Desk will be to work with the communities of these mission parishes to help them become fully established parishes with a permanent priest and church building of their own.

Step 7: The Reorganization of Diocesan Subcommittees:

Around 30 subcommittees currently serve to execute the many projects of the Diocese. As we had mentioned before, we are planning to reorganize these subcommittees and redefine their scope to make them more efficient in meeting the expanding needs of the Diocese.

We will also work on enhancing the communication network of the Diocese and making more use of audio-visual tools to facilitate the communication between the Diocese and the subcommittees in the various regions. These communication systems would also be used in linking the Diocese with the parishes, and the Diocese with various universities and schools.

Step 8: Strengthening of the Financial Position of the Diocese:

It is a fact that in the past few years, the Diocese has expanded on many levels. This also implies that the expenses have increased and the budget has almost tripled. Therefore, we have to seriously plan to search for new resources to fund the projects and secure their continuity and success.

Step 9: Expanding the Endowment Fund:

The Western Diocese endowment Fund has been able to attract a number of new contributions throughout the past few years. However, due to our focus on the Mother Cathedral project, we were not able to expand the Endowment Fund's resources to the degree that we had anticipated. Starting in 2010, we will refocus our efforts to raise awareness and encourage our faithful to make both large and small contributions to the Endowment Fund to benefit our Diocesan projects.

Step 10: Reorganize the Discipline of Ritualistic Life:

In the past few years, we have made many attempts to introduce discipline in our ritualistic life. However, due to our work overload we could not give it the attention we would have liked to. In 2009 and 2010 we will revisit this goal.

THE ACT OF PREACHING

- "... We preach Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and folly to Gentiles, but to those who are called, but Jews and Greeks, Christ is the power of God and the wisdom of God." (I Corinthians 1:23-24).
- "... that your faith might not rest in the wisdom of men but in the power of God." (I Corinthians 2:5).

The act of preaching the crucified Christ our Lord is the reflection of the understanding of our Christian faith. To me, as a servant of Christ, it implies the surrendering of life into the Hands of God. When we preach the crucified Christ our Lord, we then proclaim that Christ, Himself, is the power and the wisdom of God.

Today we celebrate the feast of the Recovery of the Cross, which in itself explains the immense love of God and His sacrificial life upon the cross for the salvation of humanity. The cross therefore is the door, which leads us to the New Life, a life with Christ our Lord, a life filled with the wisdom of Christ, our Lord. As Christ was crucified upon the cross, we then are called to live a sacrificial life, a Christ like life.

We live in a world where the crucified Christ is not preached sufficiently and as a result humanity is emptied from divine power and wisdom. The purpose of today's celebration of the Cross becomes meaningful, only when we enter into the depth of our soul and therein meet the crucified Christ. It is at that very moment that we are transformed spiritually and stripped from all kinds of evil thoughts and deeds, which distance our lives from God and humanity. To preach the crucified Christ enlightens our spirituality with a new commitment, in order that we may live a life similar to that of Christ - just and humble while filled with sacrifice and God's peace.

Dear faithful, it is my fervent prayer that we may all

nourish our spiritual lives with the message of St. Paul. "... that your faith might not rest in the wisdom of men but in the power of God." God is the destiny of our lives. In God alone we are able to begin a new life. Our trust in God allows us and strengthens us to become architects of a Christian life. Our faith in God is vital, as it enables us to have the vision to look at life as a mission, which should be fulfilled with God-pleasing deeds.

Therefore, I commend you all to hold firm the grace of your Christian faith and continue to preach the crucified Christ, thus proclaiming, that Christ is the power and the wisdom of God. May the Lord fill you all with this divine love, and guide you all to walk in accordance with the message of the Gospel. Be imitators of Christ, and the Lord God will strengthen us all in our steps to bring changes to the life of the society, and joy and peace to the heart of the people of the world.

TEST YOURSELVES

"Examine yourselves, to see whether you are holding to your faith. Test yourselves. Do you not realize that Jesus Christ is in you? - Unless indeed you fail to meet the test." (II Corinthians 13:5)

My dear faithful parishioners of St. Gregory Armenian Church, today, I offer to you the words of St. Paul, so that you may take them as the spiritual bread of the day. It is my wish and prayer that these same words may be the prayer of your heart, but above, all the mirror of your soul and your spiritual life. As we read these words and make them the prayer of our hearts, we certainly are in dialogue with the Lord. For to me these are the words of the Lord and a call from Him, which reawakens within us a new sense of commitment to apply the message of the Gospel of our Lord in our daily life.

The Church is the most holy place, where we meet God. It is the place where we are transfigured spiritually, only if we become the ambassadors of the Church's mission. If we are able to concentrate all of our efforts to preach and spread the word of God, we are able to move mountains and instill in this edifice a new spirit of brotherhood, a unique spirit of unity, which would enable us to fulfill the long-awaited responsibilities for the well-being of our children, youth and the faithful, as we reach out to them with the spiritual and lifegiving bread.

My dear faithful, each morning we dedicate a certain time to examine our physical bodies to just make sure that all the necessary steps are taken to maintain our wellbeing and our physical appearance. The same should also be applied for our spiritual life, for our faith life. When we pray we make God the mirror of our spiritual life. This Church and the community are reminded by the same test. The long awaited dream, namely the construction of the new church,

which shelters us all, has not yet been realized. We ought to work harder for the attainment of spiritual unity and the lessening of the financial burdens of the Church to pass the test and show the strength of our faith. The very words of St. Paul convey to us the truth about our faith and set forth for us the way we ought to cultivate our faith life: "Examine yourselves, to see whether you are holding to your faith. Test yourselves. Do you not realize that Jesus Christ is in you? - Unless you fail to meet the test."

I also would urge you to read the remainder of the letter of St. Paul, which is equally important for the renewal of our spiritual life. "Mend your ways [brethren], heed my appeal, agree with one another, live in peace, and the God of love and peace will be with you. Greet one another with a holy kiss. The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all." (II Corinthians 13:11-14).

With this encouraging message of St. Paul, I also convey to you all an account of witnessing of the Blessing of Muron. I wish all of you were present at the historic ceremony and have had the chance to experience the prayerful atmosphere, during which close to seventy thousand people were in attendance with a genuine desire to fill their hears with the power of the Holy Spirit. The Blessing of the Water with the new Muron will enrich your spiritual life with the same passion of those who were physically present at the Blessing ceremony. It is my wish that we all armor our spiritual life with the gifts of the Holy Spirit radiating from the Holy Muron. As we become recipients of the Holy Muron, we then sanctify our spiritual life. We become true brothers and sisters in Christ, and we then are changed inwardly to offer our love, respect, and understanding for our friends. As Christians, we all are given these gifts. The challenge that the Church offers to us ought to be respondent with our calling to apply the message of Christ in our daily life and in our relationships.

My dear faithful in Christ, we reassure you all that we will continue to serve you all and love you all with the instructions of the apostle and the power of the Holy Spirit.

May the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all. Amen.

"I AM THE VINE AND YOU ARE THE BRANCHES"

"I am the vine, you are the branches. He who abides in me, and I in him, he is it that bears much fruit for apart from me you can do nothing. If a man does not abide in me, he is cast forth as a branch can withers; ... If you abide in me, and my words abide in you, ask whatever you will, and it shall be done for you." (John 15:5-8)

These Words of Christ our Lord evoke an image from nature, which reflects a particular bond: the relationship between God and man. The vine is the anchor, or foundation, which holds the branches. The same applies to the relationship between God and man. Christ our Lord conveys to us the message that we ought to establish our lives in God and the words of God within our souls.

This is a prerequisite for us to become the disciples of Christ. The lesson that Christ conveys to us is simple and straightforward. If our lives are filled with the Spirit of Godin other words, if we have accepted God to be the true vine and established ourselves as its branches - then our lives are spiritually enriched. For a life emptied of God cannot enlighten the lives of others. God is the reason for all good thoughts and good deeds.

The words of Christ our Lord have been applied to the life of this church, St. Mary, which is in the eve of its centennial celebration. In my view, the sole reason for the continued success of the mission of this church is found in the dedication of its faithful to God. For as the branches have received their nourishment from the vine, so have our founders and leaders received their spiritual nourishment from God.

Today we are celebrating the Assumption of the Mother of God and the blessing of the harvest of your vineyards. The Feast Day of the Assumption of the Mother of God and the ceremony of the blessing of grapes lead us to understand two important messages. The first message is conveyed through the life and labor of the Mother of God, in whom we find the role model for motherhood, embodied in her humility and faithfulness, which are the most appeasing offerings possible at the holy altar. The second message is conveyed to us through the blessing of the harvest. It helps us to deepen in us the understanding that we are all bearers of Divine gifts and ought to continue listening to divine commandments and living humble lives with offerings to God, thus rendering our lives as light in the world.

If this is not the course of our lives, we become like those branches which do not grow firmly from the vine, and resemble those which eventually perish. Therefore, the Feast Day of the Assumption of the Mother of God inspires us with the messages of humility and faithfulness, which ought to be applied in our daily lives. As we bless the grapes, this traditional ceremony helps us to deepen in our hearts and souls one very important message: that God is the source of all good tidings. This is the essence of all teachings of Christianity. It is with this thought that we bring the first harvest to this holy altar to renew within our souls the very thought that God is the vine and we are the branches. Therefore, the more we read the Word of Christ our Lord, the closer we come to God.

For the words of Christ, our Lord, call upon us all to live a life with utmost dedication, like the widow who put copper coins in the treasury of the temple. Her gift pleased God more than the gifts of those wealthy men who 'contributed out of their abundance' (Mark 12:41-44).

In our God-given lives, the treasury is the Church, which is both our house of prayer and our family. We ought to dedicate our lives to our family, the Church. God, the creator of the universe, will reward us.

My dear beloved in Christ, stay steadfast in your faith; adorn your souls with the Love of God and be assured that this coming centennial anniversary will serve as a gateway to a spiritually promising future for your church.

THE PRIEST AND CONTEMPORARY CHALLENGES

"Tend the flock of God that is your charge, not by constraint but willingly, not for shameful gain, but eagerly, not as domineering over those in your charge but being examples to the flock. And when the chief Shepherd is manifested you will obtain the unfading crown of glory." (I Peter 5:2-4).

"The Church needs priests who are holy; ministers who help the faithful experience the merciful love of the Lord and who are convinced witnesses of that love." (Pope Benedict XVI).

The head of the Roman Catholic Church has this message for all priests who have accepted the calling of becoming shepherds of the mission of Jesus Christ. They must live an exemplary life devoted entirely to His service.

We live in a society in which people easily forget the omnipresence of the Lord in their lives and only acknowledge life's material realities. We as a society forget what Jesus instructed us regarding material things in this life, "Do not be anxious about your life, what you shall eat or what you shall drink, nor about your body, what you shall put on. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothing?" (Matthew 6:25).

Consequently, we priests and servants of the Church are faced with numerous struggles and challenges in society today. It is our duty to deliver the Word of God and guidance to society through the intervention of the Holy Spirit. Along these lines, the Apostle Paul writes: "Command and teach these things. Let no one despise your youth, but set the believers an example in speech and conduct, in love, in faith, in purity. Till I come, attend to the public reading of scripture, to preaching, to teaching. Do not neglect the gift you have, which was given you by prophetic utterance when

the council of elders laid their hands upon you" (I Timothy 4:11-14). He further explains his thoughts with the following words: "Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved, a workman who has no need to be ashamed, rightly handling the word of truth." (2 Timothy 2:15).

These challenges and imperatives existed at the time of Jesus Christ, and when we read the Gospels, we see so many parallels with today's society. A priest's life is a constant and joyous struggle for the salvation of people. It is ultimately his duty to guide people's souls to a spiritual path and thus to the Lord.

Priests and other spiritual leaders who face the challenges of contemporary society must be constant in withstanding the never-ending chain of political and economic challenges, through the orthodox preaching of the Word of God. Difficult contemporary issues, such as stem-cell research, child abuse, divorce, drug addiction, prostitution, globalization, and many others can be addressed only through the guidance provided by our priests in accordance with the Word of God.

A priest is an angel living on Earth, according to the expectations of the faithful. By following the example of Christ, a priest becomes the testament of love, the Good News in people's lives. Through this love, he restores lost souls, mends jealous hearts, transforms lives, changes deceitful minds, and saves those who are entrapped in sexually destructive behaviors.

Advancements in modern science do not break our bonds with God. On the contrary, they strengthen our faith and prove His omniscience and almightiness. We must apprehend such innovations as another means of reaching God and strengthening our ever-delightful relationship with Him. King David celebrates this ability of ours as follows: "The heavens are telling the glory of God; and the firmament proclaims his handiwork." (Psalm 19:1).

Job, in his conversation with the Lord, receives this admonishment from the Lord: "Where were you when I laid the foundation of the earth? Tell me, if you have under-

standing. Who determined its measurements – surely you know! Or who stretched the line upon it? Or what were its bases sunk, or who laid its cornerstone," (Job 38:4-5). And at one point Job responds as follows: "I know that thou canst do all things, and that no purpose of thine can be thwarted. 'Who is this that hides counsel without knowledge?' Therefore I have uttered what I did not understand, things too wonderful for me, which I did not know. 'Here, and I will speak; I will question you, and you declare to me.' I had heard of thee by the hearing of the ear, but now my eye sees thee; therefore I despise myself, and repent in dust and ashes." (Job 42:2-5)

A priest must be a brave and gracious shepherd who, through his faith, can condemn and ward off the wars, the injustice, the poverty, the child homelessness, the materialism, the drug addictions, the sexual perversions, and many similar vices mentioned in the Bible. Furthermore, we bear the responsibility of continuing the mission of Prophets and Apostles whose essence was undeniably that of Jesus Christ.

Pope Benedict XVI explains this as follows: "To be a Christian does not mean being 'on the side of' Christians, as one who supports a movement or approves of a cause. It means the submission of self to Christ, and the sharing in the life of his family. Christ is the vine, and you are one of the branches. Holy Communion and prayer, and the Bible are the ways in which Christ keeps you united to Him; and these are wonderful gifts, involving stupendous demands, unless you are one getting yourself to be part of its glory."

A clergyman is the preacher, the educator and the organizer in his respective community. And by doing so, he is ultimately satisfied and sustained by the Lord. Therefore, his teachings cannot differ from the teachings of Christ our Lord, as commanded in the Holy Bible: "teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, to the close of the age." (Matthew 28:20).

The presence of the clergyman in the community signifies and represents Christ Himself. This aspect of the Priesthood engenders tremendous responsibility, as noted by the Apostle Paul: "*Be imitators of me, as I am of Christ.*" (I Corinthians 11:1).

A clergyman is the preacher of God's Word. In this regard, the Apostle Paul has the following message for us: "I charge you in the presence of God and of Christ Jesus who is to judge the living and the dead, and by his appearing and his kingdom: preach the word, be urgent in season and out of season, convince, rebuke, and exhort, be unfailing in patience and in teaching. For the time is coming when people will not endure sound teaching, but having itching ears they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own likings, and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander into myths. As for you, always be steady, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, fulfill your ministry." (2 Timothy 4:1-5) A priest is the voice of God and his heart has absorbed the Good News. The words of the priest are no longer his own. Therefore, the words are delivered to those entrusted to him, to soothe their wounded souls.

Like Jesus Christ, a priest must live a life of prayer and holiness in order to shepherd his flock. The Apostle Peter says: "but as he who called you is holy, be holy yourselves in all your conduct." (1 Peter 1:15) By leading a prayerful life, a priest is guided to live a holy life, thus becoming capable of leading his flock to live in holiness. By doing so, he also becomes immune to sinful behaviors such as deceit, theft, malice, sexual perversion, and other vices, which exemplify man's lack of respect for life. The Apostle Paul had this to say to the Galatians regarding the vices of mankind and the fruits of the Holy Spirit: "I warn you, as I warned you before, that those who do such things shall not inherit the kingdom of God." (Galatians 5:21)

A priest must also teach the honest lessons of life, which are rooted in the Good News of Christ our Lord and Savior. It is also a priest's responsibility to deny and reject the scientific indulgences, which might cause the destruction of life and humanity. Pope Benedict XVI has genuinely addressed

this issue when talking about our respect for life. He has said, "If society does not respect human life from its conception to its natural end, if human conception, gestation and birth are made artificial, if human embryos are sacrificed to research, the conscience of society ends up losing the concept of human ecology and, along with it, that of environmental ecology."

In this lecture, we intend to address a few pressing issues that are prevalent in contemporary society and which beg clear answers from the Church. The first topic that we will discuss here is the evolution of work in the new context of economics.

In 1996, the U.S. Conference of the Catholic Bishops issued a statement regarding the state of the economy, titled "Framework for Economic Life," which in part reads as follows: "the economy exists for the person, not the other way around...Economic choices and institutions must be judged by how they protect or undermine the life and dignity of the person, support the family and serve the common good."

Economic policy must be formulated in a way that the life and dignity of every individual in the society is guaranteed. The right of every person to adequate housing and basic needs, as well as the protection of the environment, must be taken into consideration in policy making.

When it comes to labor issues, economic policy must protect and respect equal rights for all workers. Such policy must provide equal opportunities for everyone in order to prevent extreme economic inequality in society. Inadequate compensation and lack of job security result in crushing anxiety and psychological pressures for the workers, resulting in negative ramifications for society as a whole. The Holy Bible provides guidance for solving all of life's problems in all times. The Holy Bible grants us the necessary wisdom to tackle all of the problems highlighted in this lecture. Not all of the problems we are faced with today are literally discussed in the Holy Bible, of course. And the solutions that today's society embraces are not necessarily in harmony with the Holy Bible. When the Holy Bible becomes the rock and the

foundation of our faith and morality, everything else is set right in our lives. We will discuss the aforementioned issues one by one and present you with our own understanding of these issues, in light of the Biblical teachings to which we refer during this lecture.

The more deeply we investigate the Holy Bible, the more we become aware of these facts: Man was created in the image of God, and man is a temple where God dwells. This understanding about the nature of our existence should prompt us to live a prayerful life, listen to His call, and follow His instructions, in our attempts to comprehend various aspects of modern life.

Reading the first chapter on the first page in the first book of the Holy Bible, we realize that God is the Creator and the Lord of the heavens and earth (Genesis 1:1). We refute all of the arguments made by the followers of "dualism" concerning the heavenly reign of God and the earthly reign of the evil one, as if these two forces are in some sort of equilibrium and equal to each other. The Holy Bible speaks not only of the creation of the world by God, but also of His continuous involvement in this creation. According to Christ our Lord: "My Father is working still, and I am working." (John 5:17)

The crown jewel of God's creation is, of course, man. King David has the following words to say about this issue: "What is man that thou art mindful of him, and the son of man that thou dost care for him? Yet thou hast made him little less than God, and dost crown him with glory and honor. Thou h as given him dominion over the works of the hands; thou has put all things under his feet" (Psalm 8:4-6). "Be fruitful and multiply, and fill the earth and subdue it" (Genesis 1:28), says God. This means that we need to be stewards of the environment, since we are the unique creation of the Lord. "Then God said, 'Let us make man in our image, after our likeness." (Genesis 1:26) Making, in this context, connotes crafting; thus the creator is deeply and intimately involved with the primary creature of His creation. Another

important concept is the "like father, like son," idea, which calls us to justice, holiness, and truthfulness. Thus man is called to spread the Peace of Christ on Earth, and not peace of man. "Blessed are the merciful, for they shall obtain mercy." (Matthew 5:9)

On the other hand, our mistreatment of the environment continues because of the disobedience of Adam: "thorns and thistles it shall bring forth to you; and you shall eat the plats of the field." (Genesis 3:18) Such disobedience continues to this day. We live in a world in which scientists conduct many irresponsible experiments and then paradoxically cry out that our planet is in peril.

In his letter to the Romans, the Apostle Paul states this a little differently: "For the creation was subject to futility, not of its own will but by the will of him who subjected it in hope." (Romans 8:20-23)

A priest is the important educational figure in any society. He must freely and confidently preach and advocate for freedom and human rights. According to Christian Doctrine, he must deliver Christ's message of love.

From the Old Testament to the New Testament, the Lord's purpose is clear: to free His people from the oppression and slavery of sin. This is exemplified in the exodus from Egypt. God heard the cries of the oppressed people and acted through Moses to lead them out of Egypt. This was likewise the case when God sent His Son, Jesus Christ, into the world. Jesus said: "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to preach good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release of the captives and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty who are oppressed, to proclaim the year of the Lord." (Luke 4:18-19) It is the duty of the Church and its servants to be like Jesus and to continue His works

In his "Caritae in Veritate" pastoral address, Pope Benedict XVI states: "Practicing charity in truth helps people understand that adhering to the values of Christianity is not merely useful, but essential for building a good society and

for true integral development."

A priest, in his important roles as a preacher, a teacher and an organizer, must make his life an example through which he can lead people to God.

Today's priest must be aware of the pressures in contemporary society to get rid of the "image of God" in man.

Newspapers, television, the Internet, and all other forms of media which facilitate the destruction of the temple of God in man must be held accountable. When Christ walked into the Temple in Jerusalem, He witnessed that His Father's House had been turned into a marketplace. Christ angrily turned over the tables of the merchants. His rage was demonstrated through His spiritual legitimacy and authority. A priest is likewise an individual who wields spiritual legitimacy and authority. The Apostles and the Church Fathers also exercised the same authority when they were martyred. "The blood of the martyrs is the foundation of the Church," the Church Fathers rightfully exclaim. We witness how modern science refutes life under the guise of beneficial scientific experiments and actually destroys lives in their premature stages of existence. The Holy Bible provides a clear answer to these practices; they are condemned and regarded as sinful as murder.

How one should understand the words of the Prophet David as he states, "For thou didst form my inward parts, thou didst knit me together in my mother's womb." (Psalms 139: 13-17) The Word of the Lord tells Jeremiah "Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, and before you were born I consecrated you." (Jeremiah 1:5) There are many answers to the pressing issues of modern life in the Holy Bible. Although these issues may be contemporary in nature, the answers remain the same. Jesus characterized the last days as follows, "For as in those days before the flood they were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, until the day when Noah entered the ark." (Matthew 24:38) Therefore, let us remain in the Arc – the Church – ultimately established by the shed blood of Christ. Let us remain true to our teachings especially to those who taught us. Let us look

to Jesus Christ, our Savior, who is the truth and the life. Science has good things to offer; however, as the Apostle Paul writes, "Knowledge puffs up, but love builds up." (I Corinthians 8:1) Let us learn first and foremost from God's teachings. Consequently, it is not by coincidence that when our Church forefathers translated the Bible to Armenian, they translated the following sentences first: "That men may know wisdom and instruction, understand words of insight" (Proverbs 1:1-2), and the continuation of this thought, "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge." (Proverbs 1:7)

Hence, while science brings pride, faith fortifies. Let us remain true to love, the greatest gift of all. As the Apostle Paul says, "If I speak in the tongues of men and of angels, but have not love, I gain nothing...Love is patient and kind; love is not jealous or boastful; it is not arrogant or rude. Love does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; Love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, and endures all things. So faith, hope, love abide, these three; but the greatest of these is love." (I Corinthians 13:1-13)

"THEREFORE BE PERFECT, JUST AS YOUR HEAVENLY FATHER IS PERFECT"

This divine commandment calls on us all to deepen in spirituality the very nature of our Christian identity, the depth of our faith in Christ our Lord, the extent of our Christian love for humanity, the respect we render for God's creation. Above all, it is the commandment which challenges us to change the course of our God-given life thus leading it towards God.

St. Gregory of Nyssa, the fourth century saint and an inspiration for many, speaks of the Word of God as "the unattainable commandment." The saint puts forward the following instruction: "For in the case of those things which are good by nature, even if men of understanding were not able to attain everything, by attaining even a part they could yet gain a great deal."

"Therefore be perfect, just as your Heavenly Father is perfect." (Matthew 5:48)

I have intentionally chosen this message, for in it, I find the ultimate purpose of the mission of our church. The Church is the holy place, where we enter into the presence of God our Lord and therein we surrender our lives and the whole being into the hands of the Almighty to set a new beginning in the course of our life. your inspiration.

Let us, therefore transform our life into an expression of prayer and faith. It is only then that the entire world will become one vast Church, where mankind will follow in the footsteps of Jesus Christ from His Birth to His glorious Resurrection.

In deepening within our identity is the consciousness that all humanity is blessed by the gifts of the Holy Spirit. The sixth chapter of the Gospel according to St. Matthew teaches us about prayer and fasting. These inseparable acts aim to lead our lives towards God. "Do not lay up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal, but lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also." (Matthew 6:19-21)

Some 25 years ago, I read a book entitled "Christian Morale" authored by the late Archbishop Sion Manougian. In it, I met passages dedicated to prayer and its vital importance. I would like to share these reflections with the reader.

Prayer is the breathing of the soul. As we cannot live without breathing air, the same concept applies to our spiritual breathing. Without prayer, we are spiritually exhausted.

The purpose of prayer is to live in the presence of God, to converse with God and to be filled with divine strength.

One who is guided by prayer becomes conscious. Prayer helps us to better recognize our inner self; enables us to see the essence of our spiritual life, our egoistic feelings, our fears and doubts. Prayer cultivates within us the feeling of responsible life, but above all, humility.

Therefore, based on the thought of many as well as the reflections of the late Archbishop Manougian, we can clearly state, that prayer leads the human being to "see" God. This

grace of prayer is granted to us all without exception. However, it is important that our prayer be unceasing in nature, for prayer strengthens our spiritual life in making God the destiny of our life.

Unlike previous years, this year we have chosen to share weekly messages rather than daily reflections which were communicated to our readers on our website. Each week, we will have one specific theme. Our message for the first week of the Lenten journey is "Surrendering into the Hands of God."

To me personally, the person who commits the self to prayerful life and fasting is in a way surrendering the self into the Hands of God. Putting our trust into the Hands of God should be and is the ultimate goal in surrendering to God. For a person who craves the epitome of spiritual life needs to take three important steps.

Step one: fleeing from the ordinary life into a desert place.

Step two: the attainment of solitude and silence.

Step three: conversing with God. Any person, who is able to follow these three steps, certainly feels the presence of God. God becomes the mirror of our spiritual life.

This exercise helps us to see the depth of our true being. This is also the moment of transfiguration or spiritual transformation. Christ, our Lord, exemplified this lifestyle in paving the way for humanity towards God.

The Great Lenten period is the call for humanity to return to God. Throughout the Lenten journey, let us take courage to read the Holy Bible in a more disciplined fashion; to make the prayer of our forefathers the prayer of our heart and to exercise fasting. These steps will also help us to be the new person in Christ. St. John Chrysostom conveys to us an inspiring message in stressing the importance of change in our spiritual life, not in a sporadic fashion but in an enduring manner. "But we must see that it is not for a few days that we are required to change but rather for a whole life."

Dear faithful in Christ, I wish you a spiritually uplifting journey. Let each day of the Lenten period be a step in

bringing you closer to God. This will be the time for spiritual preparation when we mature in our faith to be able to see and grasp the ultimate destiny of the Lenten journey...the Victorious Resurrection of Christ, our Lord.

PARTNERING WITH GOD

The second Sunday of the Great Lenten Period which is namely known as the Sunday of the Expulsion can be entitled "Engagement in God's Work / Partnering with God". I have purposely chosen these titles with the thought that humanity needs a Return to God. Furthermore, by building churches, being involved in humanitarian projects and in many God-pleasing projects, we exemplify engagement in God's work. By taking on these glorious tasks, we are responding to God's call. In other words, God is seeking to enter the hearts of individuals but above all, He is showing His love and care for mankind.

The Sunday of the Expulsion is remembered in our Church with a specific reference to the first Adam who was expelled from Paradise due to his sinful life. However, during the course of the same day, the prayers of our Fathers and Gospel readings remind us that God is compassionate. In our concluding remarks, I would like to share with you brief a thought by Bill Peatman which gives us a clear understanding of what it means to be engaged in God's work.

"God appears to be looking for partners who will share in the saving work of the Gospel. God's invitation is available to us all – not based on merit or performance. God accepts us. What's in question is whether we will accept Jesus' invitation to join him."

The third Sunday of the Lenten Journey is known in the Armenian Church as the "Sunday of the Prodigal Son". The lesson of the day deepens in our spirituality many important thoughts such as confessing our wrongdoings and flaws, but above all, praying for kindness and forgiveness.

Confession and forgiveness are two virtues that ought to be applied in our lives. There is not a single day that passes without failures. However, the Christian faithful ought to evaluate his day with a confessional prayer to God. This truly is the defining moment and is the special time when we once again put on Christ and live with love. The Almighty God embraces us once again with love and kindness, with a forgiving heart, reinstating us in our original right.

This is the very lesson that all of us take from the lesson of the day, as we read the parable of the Prodigal Son. The parable mirrors our life. Therefore, let us always be forgiving in nature and be Christ's Hands to change the lives of those who have prayers of confession.

Therefore, the celebration of the Holy Resurrection of Christ defines the spreading of the heavenly light in our spiritual life. To celebrate this holy day means to find within us the hope of new visions. The Resurrection of Christ delivers to us the message to lead a humble life. In short, the Resurrection of Christ bestows upon us the love of God, so that we transform our life into a sacrifice and a gift to God's Sacred Altar.

Christ's message is: "Peace be unto you, it is I, fear not."

This is a call addressed to us all, to come into communion with the mystery of the Resurrection of Christ, and to be transformed and be draped in light and transmit holiness.

Its heavenly power, glowing through the mystery of the Resurrection, has bestowed upon humanity the understanding to turn to God, our Creator. The time is now to fill ourselves with the spirit of the Holy Resurrection, act according to its vision and carry the miraculous torch of Christ's Resurrection to future generations.

Let us turn Christ's message into a prayer in our heart and live as true Christians. Let us walk in His way and seek and see purity and goodness in every person. Let us strive to fill our soul with creative activities and finally, let us feel the inexplicable that we have transformed our life into a source of light, from whose trenches glows God's Word, the water of life that gives everlasting life to all those who partake it.

2011 THE YEAR OF THE PRIESTHOOD

In our recent publication "The 40 Day Journey of the Priest," we reflected on the "Spiritual Belonging" of the Priest and noted his crucial role in the life of the community (The 40 Day Journey of the Priest – Burbank – 2010 – p. 35).

"Serving the flock of Christ is the essence and the calling of the Priest. If we do not prioritize service over everything else in our God-given life, our lives will be filled with void. Blessed are those Priests who truly fulfill their role and enrich the lives of the faithful" (p.27). With his presence, the Priest must grace the faithful with "God's light, love, peace and hope" (p.31). Therefore, "he must constantly strive to learn and evolve, immerse himself in prayer, preach God's Word, and finally, exemplify Christ, our Lord." (p.6) With this in mind, we once again wish to emphasize the role of the Priest. "The life of the Priest must bear a "resemblance" to the life led by Christ. He must portray the presence of Christ. Through his celebration of the Divine Liturgy, the faithful commune with Jesus Christ. Therefore, do we clearly define our responsibilities and our roles in the community?" (p.5)

In addressing these concerns, we have initiated the following steps, which we believe will prove to be helpful in the life of the Western Diocese.

- Considering that the Church is comprised not only of the faithful but also of the clergy.
- Considering that the Western Diocese today is blessed with more than 50 clergymen.
- Considering the dedication and commitment of our clergymen in their parishes and communities.
- Considering the loyal service our clergymen throughout the years, we declare 2011 as the "Year of the Priesthood".

In 2011, we shall,

- Continue to pay pastoral visits to the Parishes of the Western Diocese across the Western United States. We will educate the parishioners of the crucial role of the Priest in the life of the community as well as stress the necessity of preparing new clergy in the Western Diocese.
- Centralize the Clergy Conference topics around the relationship of the Priest and the Parish and emphasize his role in the overall liveliness of the parish.
 - Analyze and exam.
- In the essence of a pastoral life. We will hold lectures on the Christian topics of "Church-Priest-Service" and offer contemporary analysis and evaluations.
- Incorporate the crucial role of the Priest in your Sunday Sermons and instruct about his crucial role in the Church to Sunday school students.
- Mandate each Parish of the Western Diocese to honor their respective Priest in the year 2011.

We hope to recruit, educate, develop and ordain new Priests while motivating and preparing our current Priesthood Candidates for a prosperous pastoral life.

One of our Church forefathers, Nerses of Lambron, writes "You took a vow; do not be weakened. You relinquished everything; do not expect pity from people. You are a learner; do not be misguided from the path, which leads to the Lord. As you preach the Holy Cross, ensure that the divine image does not fade within you. As you teach the words of the Saints, let their life be an exemplary one for you. You were invited to live an eternal life, do not succumb to the easiness of the earthly life. Prepare for death yet peacefully dream of the everlasting life" (Nerses of Lambron, Commentary on the Divine Liturgy, Venice, 1847).

Let us remember and stay true to the words of the Apostle "He disciplined us for our good, that we may share his holiness." (Hebrews 12:10)

The fourth fundamental condition is that we realize that our first and most sacred duty is to convey God's Truth and to preach His Gospel.

And the fifth and last basic condition is that we focus our attention especially on children and youngsters, and help them develop their life in the Christian spirit.

Dear delegates of the Assembly, brothers and sisters, faithful servants of the Church. The message of God's truth can be fulfilled as we all take on the responsibility to focus on three important stages in our God entrusted work.

The mission of the Church

The training of priests and lay leaders

The procurement of the necessary ways/funds

The mission of the Church in the Western Diocese is conditioned by the establishment of departments and committees. APRIL 24 A DAY OF AWARENESS

April 24 represents a sacred day in the life of our nation. On this day, in Armenia as well as in the Diaspora, every Armenian is filled with spiritual and national awareness and is reminded of the sacrifices they make to safeguard their Christian faith. Moreover, this day gives birth to a firm and unwavering vision that encompasses the entire creed of one million and a half victims.

96 years have passed since the First Genocide perpetrated by the Ottoman Turks. In this comparatively short period in history, the children of a whole generation of victims have survived, in Armenia and in the Diaspora, by believing firmly in the spirit of Christ's Resurrection, and furthermore, by making the sacred mystery of the Resurrection part of their very essence.

In one of his reflections devoted to the calamity of the Armenian Genocide, Archbishop Yeghishe, of blessed memory, has made the following statement: "Several attempts have been made to annihilate us physically; however, we have always had an inner, spiritual strength, which is difficult to explain, that has united our language, religion, national characteristics and civic struggles thus rendering our people vigorous and strong, and safeguarding its survival."

For centuries, our people have expected neither pity nor admiration, but rather the right to live freely and peacefully under the righteous God-given Sun. Naturally we cannot relinquish our rights from the lands paid for by the bloodshed of our forefathers, an undeniable and infinite debt which we have inherited.

We live in a world where people are so oppressed that they are unable to express their sense of justice. The vivid proof of that is the constant postponement of the Armenian Genocide recognition. However, this historically undeniable fact keeps the children of our nation always alert. The memory of the victims of the calamity will not allow our consciences to rest until we appropriate our rightful claims. Just like the Israelites, who roamed in the Sinai desert and turned the Ten Commandments into their spiritual guide toward the Promised Land, Armenians living outside the Motherland will roam in their own Sinai deserts and will create a brighter future inspired by visions reflected from Holy Etchmiadzin.

We pledge to keep the memory of the victims alive deep in our hearts along with the numerous sacrifices and hardships endured by our leaders during the Soviet era. We shall heed to the call "Gochem abroghats" of our Karabagh heroes, to keep alive the name of the Armenian nation and to hold onto our biblical land, where God Himself descended and blessed our nation with His Resurrection. It is this spiritual force, which, passing through our victimized forefathers, inspires in us the vision to be born again as a free and independent nation. "The dead will be forgotten when the dream is dead, and the living are dead when the dead are silent. Together, we have a dream that connects our yesteryears to our tomorrows."

Our nation's continuing dream is our Motherland, Armenia. "A meager and bleak light, sparking from the ashes of our dreams, has landed at the foot of Ararat, which, with its pale rays protects our past dreams and future radiance."

When we commemorate the memory of the victims of the Genocide, it is important to make our Motherland and Holy Etchmiadzin part of our life, for Motherland and faith are two of our most precious values that are the purpose and mission of our life.

Today, I call on to our sons and daughters, especially the younger generation, to make a pilgrimage to our roots – our Motherland. This should be the guiding principle of our life, so that by the centenary of the Genocide, every living Armenian would have visited our homeland and experienced deep in his heart the true feeling of belonging. For, the stronger our spiritual link is to our Motherland, the more genuine is our dream for a stronger and greater Armenia.

Today is yet another occasion when the Armenian Church beseeches her sons and daughters, without any exception, to strengthen within themselves the sense of leading a life in the Christian faith, laden with spiritual and moral values. To ensure our nation's immortality, it is crucial to devote us and preserve our spiritual and moral values.

Wherever we happen to reside, while demonstrating loyalty toward the local authorities, we will be favorably noticed because of our life full of faith, rich culture and centuries-old traditions and family values, which our forefathers safeguarded at the price of their lives.

While reflecting on the sacrifices suffered by the victims of the Genocide, Patriarch Yeghishe of blessed memory makes the following statement: "The 24th of April is the tragedy that we have inherited from our past. The noblest duty of our generation is to always keep its memory alive. If we succeed to preserve the ideals for which our ancestors perished, and unite, hand in hand in brotherly love, then our forefathers will rest in peace and we would have accomplished our duty. Only then can we claim that April 24, though a day of mourning, is also a day of resurrection. We were persecuted and murdered but we were never lost. Our forefathers who perished paved the way to our immortality."

Guided by these principles, we should strive to become a strong nation, by achieving economic success, by playing important roles in local political arenas, by acquiring a good reputation in the media, by encouraging the younger generation to strive for higher education, and by becoming top achievers in the realm of the arts and sciences. It is then that the bigger powers of the world will take heed of our demands for restitution.

Our prayers and demands are just. We need to manifest a life rich in faith, by turning the love of God into the spiritual energy that binds all our hearts into one, which, as an innocent flower, we will place on the Holy Altar of our fallen ancestors as our most beautiful gift.

PREPARE FOR THE GREAT LENT

The Great Lenten Journey is a unique time in the life of the Christian faithful which calls on us to set aside a special time to be with and to walk alongside Christ, our Lord.

This year, I have chosen seven messages for the seven weeks of the Great Lent. The author of these selected messages (quotes), is the late Patriarch of Jerusalem Archbishop Yeghishe Derderian (1910-1990). Undoubtedly, the following messages help us to transform our spirituality as we prepare ourselves to celebrate the Victorious Resurrection of Christ, our Lord.

Week One: (Carnival Sunday)

"Today, fasting is not practiced properly. To many, it has been regarded as an unnecessary burden on the physical body which has been passed down to us from our church fathers. However, our church fathers have understood well the importance of the healing of our soul more so than the body. Through fasting, they were eager to adopt the means to heal the soul, thus preparing the body to become the ground (soil) for the cultivation of one's spirituality."

The Carnival Sunday (Great Baregentan) is the day when we make the promise to renounce from all physical pleasures thus paving the way to walk toward God. The readings of the day, the hymns and prayers lead us to the newness of life in Christ.

Fasting is not a burden placed on our physical body (Matthew 6:16). It is a spiritual discipline which we have inherited from the Lord Himself and our Church forefathers. It is also a necessity for the healing of our souls (Matthew 17:20). Therefore, the Christian faithful who walks through the Lenten Journey fills the self with Divine Light (I Timothy 6:16). The faithful takes a promise to lead a Christ-like life (I Corinthians 11:1) but above all, while searching within the

inner-self, he aims to identify the man created in the image of the Almighty God (*Genesis 1:27*).

Week Two:

"If fasting is a religious practice by nature, in its content is the preparation to walk towards God and a wonderful tool for the salvation of our souls. The human person is also equally graced by the spiritual gift for we have within us the image of the Creator. The spiritual sense within us is certainly the reflection of God's image which reawakens within us the longing for God."

Fasting is certainly a practical expression of prayer for it leads us toward God. Those who fast in a disciplined manner deepen in their faith life the very sense that they belong to God in purifying within themselves the image of the Creator. In our perseverance to pray and fast, we hold firm within us the vision to see and equally feel the presence of God in our being. This unity with God leads humanity toward sanctity and the blessed life.

Week Three:

"The human person is the battleground for spiritual and physical encounters. On one hand, as human beings, we love our physical body while on the other hand, we equally love our soul and pursue the noble aspiration to free our soul from evil. Therefore, humanity's mission is to harmonize these two encounters in such a unique way that they can co-exist in harmony."

Fasting purifies in our human identity the ultimate truth about the conflict between the material and the spiritual. When the physical entity defeats the spiritual, then we are distanced and separated from God. What is expected from us that the spiritual within us should never be subjected. On the contrary, our physical bodies are intended to become the Temple of the Almighty (I Corinthians 3:16).

Week Four:

"Each human being is a shareholder in the Divine Nature through the spirit and the body... When our spirit is

weakened, it becomes the pray for the physical body. However, when we discipline our bodies, the soul becomes the dominant...God does not embrace the weak souls and the weak bodies."

The ultimate goal of the Great Lenten Journey is to lead humanity towards God. The words of the Patriarch are most inspiring as he concludes, "God does not embrace the weak souls and the weak bodies." As we lead a life of fasting and prayer, we expel within us the weakened soul which then is replaced by the Love of Christ and the presence of the Almighty God.

Week Five:

"Without the perception of the conflict of the spiritual and the physical, we cannot realize within us the Life of Christ which would also help us to understand the crucifixion and the Mystery of the Resurrection..."

The Christian faithful cannot grasp the true meaning of the Mystery of the Resurrection and cannot relate to the Miracle without proper preparation and fasting. Those who walk through the Lenten Journey are able to have the vision to live with the Victory of the Resurrection.

Week Six:

"As Christ was crucified, He then realized the ultimate sacrifice...He took upon Himself all the human sufferings Without this aspect of Christ's taking upon Himself the human sufferings we would not be able to relate to Him..."

Through fasting in actuality we live a Christ-like life. We also become partakers in His Resurrection (Romans 6:11, Colossians 3:1). Therefore, in a sense, fasting in its own unique way is a kind of crucifixion for we become Christ-like and partakers in His sufferings and crucifixion.

Week Seven:

"Faith is the possible impossible. Those who believe in the possible are wise. Those who believe in the everlasting are great. Those who hope for the impossible are the perfect amongst people...Those who love themselves, they are merely worth the self. Those who love their friends are the dedicated ones. Moreover, those who love God are capable of loving the entire world...The Great Lenten Journey is the time for self-criticism, self-recognition and self-enlightenment..."

Fasting is the most important tool which strengthens our faith as the armor against all adversities and temptations (Ephesians 6:10-18) which lead humanity to destruction. It is a temptation when love is self-centered. The Patriarch's message is most inspiring. "Those who love God are capable of loving the entire world."

Beloved faithful,

Stay steadfast and apply fasting in your spiritual life in order that you may grow in the three steps, namely self-criticism, self-recognition and self-enlightenment which lead us to God. As we walk towards God, we then enter into the Highest State of spirituality – united with God (John 17:21).

HOLY WEEK

From the liturgical viewpoint, Holy Week is the most decorated timeframe in the Christian Church. It is the period where the faithful relives the final week of Christ's life on Earth from His triumphant entry to the Holy City to His sufferings and crucifixion and finally, His Victorious Resurrection.

We call upon each faithful to be immersed in the liturgical life throughout Holy Week. The week-long Gospel readings, the singing of the heavenly hymns, the recitation of the heartfelt prayers help the faithful to better understand the essence of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. As a keen participant in the liturgical life during Holy Week, the Christian faithful surrenders his life into the compassionate Hands of Christ, thus reawakening within him a New Life.

Herein we present the most noteworthy days of the Holy Week:

PALM SUNDAY

On Palm Sunday, Christ triumphantly enters Jerusalem, the Holy City, where he is welcomed and greeted by the faithful exclaiming Hosanna. A little later we will examine the act of Christ cleansing the Temple. The act exemplifies the beginning of a New Life with Christ. The path leading to God opens through Christ.

OPENING OF THE DOORS / "TERNPATZEK"

The Opening of the Doors / Ternpatzek ceremony is performed in the evening on Palm Sunday. The ceremony is symbolic in a sense that it relates to the opening of the heavenly doors that are reserved only for the righteous. It is necessary to include the inspirational and spiritually uplifting dialogue that occurs during the ceremony. We present the dialogue in its entirety without further commentary.

From the inside:

"Who are they for whom I shall open the door? For this door belongs to the Lord and only the righteous may enter through it."

From outside, the priest says:

"It is not only the righteous that may enter through it but also those sinners who confess and repent."

From the inside:

"For this is the door to heaven and the valley of sadness, the Almighty God covenanted James – the resting place of the righteous, the purgatory for sinners, the Kingdom of Christ, the abode of the angels, the assembly of the saints, the city of hope and the House of God."

From outside, the priest says:

"Your sayings about the Holy Church are valuable and just, since for us the Church is the pure mother from whom children of light and righteousness are born – for us it is the path to justice and it leads us to the Heavenly Father."

From the inside:

"Let us see our Lord Jesus Christ whose Throne is on the Holy Altar and who calls to Him those who do according to His will, for wherever I am, there shall be my official."

From outside, the priest says:

"We are the outcome of the undiluted blood of the Son of God. We zealously praise our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ and exclaim in unison "Glory to your Advent, O Lord."

From the inside:

"The Trumpet of God calls with the words "The Groom is coming, come to him and greet him."

From outside, the priest says:

"Here I am with God's children trusted to me and we wish to see Christ and hear His blessed voice."

From the inside:

"The Creator's voice calls and says: Come, blessed children of my Father and inherit the Kingdom promised to you since the beginning of time."

MAUNDY THURSDAY

On Maundy Thursday, the liturgical-worship service of the Church presents the Last Supper, the Washing of the Feet and the Sufferings of Christ. The Last Supper is the sacrament of the Divine Liturgy, the pillar of the Church. The faithful witness the immense sacrifice of Christ in the celebrant priest. This in itself is a subject of a broad spectrum and could be analyzed in great detail. The Washing of the Feet Service represents the humility of Christ. The act is symbolic, for Christ conveys to us the notion to live a life of humility and virtue. The sufferings of Christ clearly explain His willingness to endure the unbearable sufferings for the spiritual salvation of humanity.

GOOD FRIDAY

The burial service of Christ is presented on Good Friday. The significance of Good Friday lies in the notion that light radiates from the tomb of Christ. It is for this reason that the faithful humbly sings "We praise Your burial."

EASTER EVE

During the Divine Liturgy on Easter Eve, the Church announces of the Victorious Resurrection of Christ thus establishing the New Life of man in Christ. For close to two millennia, the world has preached of the Blessed Resurrection of Christ. With a firm belief in the Victorious Resurrection of Christ, an insurmountable number of faithful have renewed their lives. They have rejected the within them the first Adam and have accepted in their being the second Adam. In other words, they have made a covenant with God to live lives filled with the Love of Christ.

HOLY EASTER

On Easter Sunday, the Church and the faithful celebrate the Victorious Resurrection of Christ. The sacrament of the Resurrection is not a science, nor can it be negotiable. Holy Easter is a spiritual feeling that cultivates the essence of the faithful. Similar to the love that binds us with our relatives, the Resurrection of Christ ought to become an inner spiritual feeling that captures our essence.

Palm Sunday, 2012

"HE IS NOT HERE; FOR HE HAS RISEN"

These words are uttered by an angel of the Lord to the women who went to see the sepulcher of Christ at dawn on Sunday. There, the women are met by God's angel who informs them of the Miraculous and Victorious Resurrection of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ with the words "He is not here; for He has risen." (Matthew 28:6)

The Victorious Resurrection of Christ is the sole miracle which transforms the essence of humanity. One of the prominent bishops of last century offered the following insight on the glory of this event. "The idea of the Resurrection which brings forth the notion that life does not end in the tomb, is the light of an everlasting life within our souls. The Victorious Resurrection of Christ is the greatest miracle of all." Archbishop Yeghishe Derderian, late Armenian Patriarch of Jerusalem (1910-1990).

With the Glorious Resurrection of Christ, the Christian faithful affirms the new life in Christ and renews his covenant with God. We speak of a New Life, where one's unshakable faith allows for the ability to see beyond the confines of the material life. Empowered with the blessed gift of the Christian Faith, one becomes a creator, an architect of light, a notable spiritual presence to transform lives and steer those who are lost to the path leading to the Creator, the All Merciful God.

Patriarch Archbishop Yeghishe Derderian's ability to illustrate the Miraculous Resurrection of Christ is captivating to say the least. "In Christ's Resurrection we see the fall and defeat of what seemed to be the unconquerable death. As the soul of man bears the image of God, it is predestined to exist in eternity rather than a time frame."

Indeed, the Glorious Resurrection of Christ affirms the crushing defeat of death. The miracle of the Resurrection is

the source of all miracles. For ages, humanity has accepted the mystery of the Resurrection, thus capturing the meaning of divine life. To relinquish the concept of the miracle intrinsically means to abandon God and to believe in a brief life span. On the other hand, those who fill the soul with the mystery of the Resurrection define and outline the essence of the Christian faithful – one who leads a life with the vision of the Resurrection and one who is involved in God-pleasing endeavors. Equipped with God's everlasting presence, the Christian faithful becomes a living and breathing Gospel.

The mystery of Christ's Resurrection has enlightened the lives of people around the world. The outcome of the Miraculous Resurrection of our Lord is revealed through the establishment of the Church. "The Righteous Resurrection of Christ is His Church. As the source of the Christian lifestyle and universal civilization." (Patriarch Yeghishe Derderian) In other words, the Church bears a strong resemblance of Christ in modern society. The Church is the eternal ray of Christ's Miraculous Resurrection. It is the Body to which we belong – the Body of Christ which flourishes through our kind deeds.

"He is not here; for he has risen."

The period of the Great Lent was a spiritual journey which brought us to the destination of the Victorious Resurrection of Christ. As we fill our lives with prayer and prepare for spiritual rebirth, we can join the angel of God in exclaiming "He is not here; for he has risen."

As Christians, we are the One Body of Christ. In our inner selves, we witness the presence of Christ. We walk with Him on the Way to the Cross and ascend with Him where we will reunite with God and live alongside the Creator.

The Armenian Apostolic Church celebrates the Resurrection of Christ with the following hymn – "O Lord, Glory to Your Resurrection." These words contain the essence of our creed. If our Church fathers did not live their lives according to this creed, they would not have been able to overcome numerous obstacles and surely, their legacy would have been

long erased from the pages of history. The Victorious Resurrection of Christ, in a sense is applicable to the Resurrection of our people and the spiritual reawakening of our Motherland. The history of the Armenian people has been one of martyrdom for we have shared the sufferings of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. However, like Christ, we have always emerged "victorious over death" due to the unbreakable chain of miracles that has strengthened the spirituality of the Armenian people.

"He is not here; for he has risen."

The empty Tomb of Christ is a testament to Christ's Glorious and Victorious Resurrection and to His everlasting divine light that has found shelter in the hearts of Christian faithful.

Beloved faithful,

On Holy Easter, the most significant Feast Day of the Church calendar, let us kneel before the Holy Altar as a sign of our humility, respect and honor for our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. In the sacred sacrament of the Divine Liturgy, let us apply the mystery of His Glorious Resurrection in our daily lives. Let us accept Holy Communion with the intention to turn our lives over to the Lord and pass on His divine light to future generations in order that the gates to eternal life may open before them.

"Christ Has Risen From the Dead, Blessed is the Resurrection of Christ."

THE EVE OF APRIL 24

"Destroy this temple and I will raise it again in three days." (John 2:19)

The message of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ empowers us spiritually to understand the notion that the Temple Christ our Lord refers to is His Body which as a result of His crucifixion has been laid for the salvation of humanity. The message of our Lord is a clear reminder of Christ's crushing victory over death through His Glorious Resurrection, the very foundation of our Christian faith.

"Destroy this temple and I will raise it again in three days."

For nearly two thousand years, these words were echoed in the spiritual lives of our people. Time after time external forces tried to destroy the "Temple", the essence and identity of our people. The "Temple" was our Homeland, our people – the heirs of the of Armenian Holy Apostolic Church, who physically perished yet were raised again in "three days" just as Christ was resurrected from the dead. Ninety-seven years ago, the Young Turk regime carefully planned and executed the systematic extermination of the Armenian people, a horrific chapter in our history. Ninety seven Aprils later, sons and daughters of the fallen martyrs and the entire nation continue to honor their blessed memory.

For Armenians, the 20th century commenced with a woeful path to Golgotha. However, our people emerged victorious as a result of their unshakable Christian faith, their firm belief in the restoration of the "Temple" and the Resurrection of our nation.

Let us commemorate the 97th anniversary of the Armenian Genocide with the vision of our fallen ancestors. April 24 is no longer a day of mourning and sorrow. April 24th is a symbol of victory for our resurrected nation.

THE ORDINATION OF DEACON MATTHEW ASH INTO THE PRIESTHOOD

THE PRIEST AS THE UNIFIER OF THE FAITHFUL IN CHRIST

The priest is the pastor and leader of his flock, the faithful of Christ's Holy Church. Just as a shepherd is entrusted with the serious responsibility of caring for his flock, the priest is obliged to unite the faithful in Christ making the Lord and Savior the very center of their lives.

THE PRIEST AS A MESSENGER OF GOD'S WORD

The priest is responsible for spreading the Word of God. Just as Christ taught and preached, the priest must follow in His footsteps and spread the light of His Gospel. Through his calling, the priest is a teacher and a mentor. He cultivates souls through the Love of Christ.

THE PRIEST AS LIGHT AND SOLACE TO THE FAITHFUL

Leading a sacrificial life, the priest becomes the light and solace for the faithful. In other words, the priest must unite the faithful of the Church by delivering the Word of God and leading a Christ-like life.

The life of the Priest ought to serve as an example to the faithful, for he is the representative of Christ. Only by following in the footsteps of Christ will the priest truly resemble Him and serve as a vivid example of a life of righteousness lived for the glory of God.

THE PRIEST AS A FATHER FIGURE

The pastoral life of a priest is truly diverse and in many ways it is similar to a shepherd who has taken his sheep to pasture. The priest must always be prepared to tend to the spiritual needs and concerns of his flock without exception. Therefore, the priest is a true father figure for an entire community of Christ.

PRIESTHOOD IS A CALLING AND A MISSION

Words can never fully describe the Sacred Order of the Priesthood as this sacred sacrament can be fulfilled only by living a life in Christ.

We dedicate these reflections to Dn. Matthew Ash on the auspicious occasion of his ordination and consecration into the Sacred Order of the Priesthood. We are delighted to lead a young servant of Christ as he prepares to dedicate his life to the mission of the Armenian Holy Apostolic Church. Dear Dn. Matthew, you have chosen the path to righteousness which requires from you to lead a life filled with prayer. Since your return the Mother See of Holy Etchmiadzin, we have seen in you a spiritually transformed individual. You have truly grown and matured after furthering your theological studies. May the offerings you have received from the spiritual center of All Armenians guide you always. We have no doubt that you will become an alert priest who shall preach the Word of God, thus enriching the spirituality of the faithful. May you become the light and solace for the people of God and remain steadfast in your calling to "serve without shame."

The will of the Almighty God needs to be reflected in our collective efforts as the living sons and daughters of the Armenian Apostolic Church just as Christ commanded the Apostles soon after His Glorious Resurrection. "Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit." (Matthew 28:19)

Diocesan assemblies are wonderful venues for applying the will of God in our Church and community lives. They are imperative venues to review the course of our mission with true faith, and with a forgiving heart.

Through humility and renewed commitment we aim to become the Hands of the Almighty God in the life of the world in order to fulfill all duties and responsibilities entrusted to us, thus becoming living Gospels.

I wish to share with you a reflection which has also become part of my spirituality. This reflection is expressed through words of Archbishop Desmond Tutu.

When I asked about its importance to the community, I was told that it shows how God relies on us to do God's work in the world.

These are words which clearly define the notion that all of us are engaged in the holy work of God in becoming the arms and hands of the crucified Christ.

Attached to my message, I present to you two sets of reports. The first is the Annual Report (May 2011 – April 2012) and the second is an overview of the work of the missions accomplished from 2003 – 2011 as a result of the collective participation of pastors and lay leaders of the Diocese. Encourage your children to form a bond with the Church in order that they may belong to the Body of Christ and may grow according to sacred Armenian teachings. Ask yourselves such questions as how frequently do we attend Church? What role does the Church play in my life and in the life of my family? Have we done our part to ensure that our children are educated in the Church? The reason why a number of our community's children are engaged in wrongdoings is due to the lack of the Church in their lives, for they have distanced themselves from our Savior. The instability and the chaos that dwells within our families is due to the lack of spirituality within its core. Parents, make it your first priority to ensure that your children are raised in a religious environment. Providing only financial stability for your children is a sign of weakness and is a form of escape. The Church and her vision must live and thrive within the family, for the Armenian family must be the source for growth and progress of the Church.

We call upon all parents to fill your house with the Word of God, the radiating light of the Gospel of Christ. It is our wish that you answer to our call and encourage your children to be engaged in the life of the Armenian Holy Apostolic Church in order that they may flourish spiritually and distance themselves from false teachings which stain the Armenian Christian lifestyle and act as a hindrance to our unshakable ancestral faith.

Beloved parents, you are the Church. Be bound to the Church which stems from Christ, The Son of God. Be involved in the life of the Church through unceasing prayer, humble service. Involve your children and the youth by enrolling them in Sunday Schools and in youth programs. Let the Church mold, educate, and define their essence. It is only then that you will attest to the spiritual transformation of your families and will witness God's love and wisdom that is ever so present in each of the members.

The mission and the sacred duty of the Church is not realized solely by the clergy or the priest. We can only succeed in the noble mission if we dedicate ourselves to collective service and provide our youth the spiritual education and discipline it so dearly requires.

In his book entitled **Heavenly Family** (Trakhdi Undanik), Khrimian Hayrig writes, "The home and the family is a small kingdom with defined boundaries. It knows no violence, no sword, and no staff. WESTERN DIOCESE IN ACTION

"The Church in action will be the key theme in every corner of this Diocese. New missions, projects, activities and policies will be initiated regularly. A flurry of activities will energize our parishes, our youth and our Diocese." (May 3, 2003).

Since May 2003 the Western Diocese has been revitalized with many new projects and missions. At the core of this growth was the consecration of numerous churches that have since inspired our faithful and spread the mission of the Armenian Apostolic Church to communities that had long been yearning for a spiritual and cultural presence. Let us not lose the zeal in doing good as our *collective* efforts have lit the path to the mission of the Armenian Apostolic Church.

Diocesan Headquarters

Arshag and Eleanor Dickranian Diocesan Complex

"The strength of a Diocese lies in its ability to stay on the right path."

During the Primacy of Archbishop Hovnan Derderian, the Diocesan Headquarters and the adjacent areas underwent renovation. The renovated areas included the Nazareth and Sima Kalaydjian Banquet Hall, the Paul Brothers Galleria, the Armen Hampar Reception Room, a portion of the administrative offices and the Primate's reception room. With the creation of new departments and addition of staff, the next phase of renovation and improvements is already in the planning phase to accommodate for the departments and personnel within the administrative offices.

• Personnel

The expansion of Diocesan programs and missions are a testament with the staffing of trained and professional employees. In the short span of 8 years, the number of Diocesan employees has nearly tripled and presently totals 16 members. Of the 16 full-time employees, 13 hold a bachelors degree or higher and 8 of which hold post-graduate degrees from accredited educational institutions. In addition, a majority of the staff participate in continuous education programs in field specific areas to keep pace with the continually advancing employment landscape.

• Office of the Executive Director

At the direction of the Primate, the position of the Executive Director was created in 2006. One of the primary responsibilities of the Executive Director is to ensure efficiency in management of the every-day operation of the Diocese. In addition, the Executive Director is responsible for implementing policies and procedures approved by the Diocesan Council. Working under the direction of the Primate and Diocesan Council, the Executive Director is also responsible in management of all employees and all personnel matters (including employee benefits). In consultation with the Primate, the Executive Director also recommends personnel policies and budgetary proposals. Another key element of the office of the Executive Director is to ensure all employees are equipped with adequate resources to provide support not only to the Diocese and the Diocesan Parishes but also to further promote the mission of Armenian Apostolic Church throughout the Western Diocese.

Harout Markarian holds a B.A. in Political Science (California State University, Northridge) and a M.A. in Public Administration (University of San Francisco). Serving the Diocese since 2008.

• Religious Education Department

In 2005, the Primate issued a directive for the creation of an essential department within the Western Diocese, namely the Religious Education Department. Aimed at providing spiritual nourishment and promoting Christian values, the Religious Education Department holds weekly Bible study sessions, caters to the spiritual needs of students and provides lectures/seminars for Diocesan Priesthood-Candidates. In addition, the Religious Education Department is responsible for nearly 300 religious and educational publications since its formation in 2005.

Mashdots Jobanian holds a B.A. and M.A. in Religious & Philosophical Studies (Norwegian Theological Seminary) and a Recovery Ministry certificate (Fuller Seminary). Serving the Diocese since 2006.

• Office of the Youth Director

The Office of the Diocesan Youth Director was reorganized at the discretion of the Primate. The Youth Director manages a separate department where various youth programs and missions are organized, planned and executed. The Youth Director oversees the Christian Youth Mission to Armenian which serves to unify and strengthen the Armenian community by establishing a bridge between Diaspora's Youth and Our Homeland through participation in the social, religious, professional and cultural life of Hayastan. In addition, the Youth Director oversees the Armenian Church Youth Organization which actively integrates its members into the life of the church by providing opportunities for Worship, Service, Education, and Fellowship in Christ according to the doctrines and traditions of the Armenian Apostolic Church.

Fr. Avedis Abovian holds a B.A. and M.Div. in Religious Studies (Claremont School of Theology). Serving the Diocese since 2008.

• Communications Department

The Western Diocese employs contemporary methods in efforts to reach out to the Diocesan faithful. The website of the Western Diocese is a vital source of communication with the faithful. The weekly e-newsletter has over 3,800 subscribers. In 2012, the website will undergo a series of changes and will include interactive content (videos, podcasts, etc.). The new changes and educational content that will be inclu-

ded in the revamped Western Diocese website will serve not only as a resource for the Western Diocese faithful but also the faithful of the Armenian Church throughout the world.

Sergey Arustamyan holds a B.A. in Business Administration (California State University, Northridge). Serving the Diocese since 2009.

• TV and Media Department

In 2005, Archbishop Hovnan Derderian spearheaded a new project with a Diocesan television program called "The Voice of the Armenian Church." The success of the program was echoed throughout the community. In February 2011, a television and media department was launched. Upon completion of the St. Leon Cathedral, the studio of the TV and Media Department was opened with state-of-the-art equipment. Located adjacent to the Zorayan Museum of the Western Diocese, the TV and Media Department studio is used for taping the weekly television programs and various other promotional, spiritual and cultural programs. Presently, the Diocesan programs are aired on a global Armenian network and are also made available through social media such as YouTube and Facebook.

Vahe Sargsyan holds a B.A. and M.A. in Theological Studies (Yerevan State University). Serving the Diocese since 2009.

Aram Mousoian holds a B.A. in Television Production (California State University, Northridge). Serving the Diocese since 2010.

• Western Diocese Endowment Fund (WDEF)

The WDEF is one of the pillars of the financial security and stability of the Western Diocese. Income derived from the fund sponsors educational programs, humanitarian missions, building projects and many other missions. Established in 1979, the contributions to the Western Diocese Endowment Fund have increased dramatically since 2003 thus further ex-

panding the operations of the Western Diocese. The WDEF is currently chaired by Ben Krikorian.

• The Aga Sargsian Library

The official opening ceremony of the Aga Sargsian Library of the Western Diocese was held on June 6, 2006 and was presided by His Holiness Karekin II, Supreme Patriarch and Catholicos of All Armenians. The library houses over 7,000 books and periodicals, some of which have been graciously donated by our faithful. Additionally, the completion of a recent project has enabled the Aga Sargsian Library to make available and share its inventory of 7,000 plus books with other libraries throughout the United States.

Hayk Madoyan holds a B.A. and M.A. in Theological Studies (Yerevan State University). Serving the Diocese since 2004.

• Zorayan Museum

The official opening ceremony of the Zorayan Museum of the Western Diocese was held on September 11, 2010, the day of the consecration of St. Leon Armenian Cathedral. The ceremony was presided by His Holiness Karekin II, Catholicos of All Armenians during his Fourth Pontifical Visit to the Western Diocese. As a well known and respected venue within the community, the Zorayan Museum has hosted the exhibits of such renowned artists as Carzou and Pinajian. Presently, the Zorayan Museum houses precious historical and religious artifacts such as rugs, manuscripts, vestments, metals and coinage. In addition, various artists have donated artwork and sculptures that are currently displayed in the Zorayan Museum. Hayk Madoyan is the current Curator. Antranik Zorayan is the current chair of the Zorayan Museum Committee.

• Western Diocese Summer Camp

Western Diocese Summer Camp is a 160-acre property located in Dunlap, California about 225 miles north of the

Western Diocese and St. Leon Cathedral. It is within five miles of the entrance to Kings Canyon and the Sequoia National Park at an elevation of 4,400 feet. The property offers a unique, serene retreat setting, perfect for reflection and fellowship. The Western Diocese Summer Camp program has been created to nurture the bodies, minds, and spirits of Armenian youth in a natural setting, providing a stimulating environment of community which inspires individual growth and the values of Christian Fellowship. Acquired on December 3, 1987, the Diocesan campgrounds underwent a series of additions and renovations during the Primacy of Archbishop Derderian. Such additions included the building of new log cabins, the addition of the tennis and basketball courts, the boat house, the placement of a cross-stone (khatchkar sculpted in Armenia), and the newly completed staff housing. The Youth Director, Fr. Avedis Abovian, oversees the Summer Camp. The Summer Camp Committee and the Camp Board are responsible for the organization and operation of the camp.

St. Leon Armenian Cathedral Parish

"The vision of the Diocesan Cathedral is the crowning of our faith life."

The vision of building the Diocesan Cathedral dates back to 1927, since the establishment of the Western Diocese of the Armenian Church of North America. This vision has always brought together the faithful under the leadership of our former Primates. It is during the Primacy of His Eminence Archbishop Hovnan Derderian that this vision truly gained momentum and was realized in September 2010.

The Ground blessing Ceremony of the Cathedral was held on October 2, 2007 and was presided by His Holiness Karekin II, Catholicos of All Armenians. On September 11, 2010, the Pontiff presided over one of the most sacred rites of the Armenian Apostolic Church, the consecration of St. Leon Armenian Cathedral, the spiritual center of the Western Diocese.

Fr. Khajag Shahbazyan holds a M.Div. in Theology (Claremont School of Theology). Serving as the Pastor of St. Leon Cathedral since 2010.

Diocesan Clergy

"A clergyman, as a humble servant of the Church, ought to extend to the flock of Christ an invitation to a new life."

The number of clergy within the Western Diocese of the Armenian Church of North America is among the highest in the world. As communities get larger, the need for pastoral care and guidance becomes greater. Over ten clergymen were invited to the Western Diocese for administrative or pastoral duties since 2003.

• Stewardship Program

In 2004, in order to address pastoral shortages as a result of retiring clergy and an expanding Diocese, the Stewardship Program of the Western Diocese of the Armenian Church of North America was re-organized by Diocesan Primate Archbishop Hovnan Derderian. The Stewardship Committee is currently chaired by Dr. Vahram Biricik.

By the Grace of God and the financial support of Diocesan faithful, five (5) young clergymen have been ordained since 2008 and have taken on challenging pastoral assignments within their respective communities. These promising young priests have dedicated their lives to serving our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ and the Armenian Apostolic Church. They include:

• Deacons and Acolytes

St. Stephen the Protodeacon is the vivid example of selfless and dedicated service to Christ and His Church. Since his election as Primate, Archbishop Hovnan Derderian has ordained a great number of acolytes, sub-deacons and deacons enriching the Western Diocese of the Armenian Church of North America with devout servants of Christ. 102 Deacons, 108 Sub-Deacons, 62 stole-bearers, and nearly 300 acolytes have been ordained throughout the Western Diocese since 2003.

New and Mission Parishes

"The establishment of parishes within the Western Diocese is one of the most crucial missions, as with the formation of each parish, a new family is formed."

Since the founding of the Western Diocese 84 years ago, up until the Primacy of Archbishop Hovnan Derderian, the Western Diocese had 25 parishes under its jurisdiction. In the last nine years, eight properties were acquired and nine mission parishes were formed.

It is worth mentioning that new properties were acquired for the Crescenta Valley, Las Vegas, and San Diego parishes. The adjacent property to St. Mary Armenian Apostolic Church was also acquired as part of the expansion process of the parish. The Taglyan Cultural Complex was built next to St. John Garabed Armenian Church in Hollywood and the Kirkjan Hall was built adjacent to St. Garabed in Rancho Mirage.

Missions in Armenia

- "Armenia is an everlasting truth..."
- Etchmiadzin Children's Fund (ECF)

The Etchmiadzin Children's Fund, a mission which aims to reach out to the orphans and financially disadvantaged children in Armenia (up until the age of 16), is one of the dearest to the heart of the Primate. Established during the Primacy of His Eminence Archbishop Vatche Hovsepian, much of the success of the ECF has been recorded in the recent years. A vivid proof of this statement is the number of sponsored children. Initially, 250 children received financial assistance. Today, the number has more than doubled. Close to 600 children receive financial support through the efforts of kind-hearted individuals. The sponsorship level has also increased from \$250 to \$365 (\$1/day). The ECF Committee is currently chaired by Gayane Tatoulian.

• Mer Hooys – House of Hope

"Hope does not disappoint, because the love of God has been poured out within our hearts through the Holy Spirit who was given to us," are the words of St. Paul the Apostle in his Epistle to the Romans (chapter 5 verse 5.) The dedicated individuals of the Mer Hooys-House of Hope mission have instilled in the hearts of Armenian orphans this exact message of hope.

Mer Hooys' mission is to provide opportunities for achieving a productive and secure future to many young adults in Armenia who have outgrown their childhood homes in orphanages or who come from disadvantaged lifestyles. Mer Hooys provides housing and a family environment for young women in need and reaches out to both young men and women from disadvantaged lifestyles who otherwise have no hope of receiving higher level education, job skills training and life skills development. The Mer Hooys Committee is currently chaired by Hon. Adrienne Krikorian.

• Christian Youth Mission to Armenia (CYMA)

CYMA was established by Archbishop Hovnan Derderian in Canada in 1992. At the time, the acronym stood for Canadian Youth Mission to Armenia. After his election to

the Primacy of the Western Diocese of the Armenian Church of North America, CYMA was incorporated into the life of the Western Diocese as Christian Youth Mission to Armenia and began to flourish.

Through CYMA, Armenian youth connect with their spiritual and cultural identity. Some of the activities during the trip include visiting spiritual and cultural monuments, internship opportunities amongst various institutions, interaction with youth from around the world, and introduction to contemporary Armenian society. Fr. Avedis Abovian oversees the CYMA mission and the current chair for the CYMA committee is Armine Semirdjian.

• Sister Church Program

The Sister Church Program was founded on the basis to provide financial support to the churches in Armenia. Considering that the Diocese of Gougark is presently in dire need of a helping hand, the Western Diocese sought it vital to extend a helping hand to the historical churches not only to the Diocese of Gougark but also to many others.

• Completed Projects in Armenia

In recent years, a number of dedicated faithful became involved in church building projects in Armenia. Among them included Diocesan benefactors Mr. and Mrs. Gerald and Patricia Turpanjian who sponsored the complete renovation of the Harichavank monastery and the adjacent theological seminary. Others include benefactors Bedros and Anna Oruncakciel whose generosity made it possible for the building of the Conference Hall and the Gymnasium in the Mother See of Holy Etchmiadzin. St. Leon Cathedral Godfathers and Diocesan Benefactors Drs. Petros and Karine Taglyan made a generous contribution to the library of the Mother See of Holy Etchmiadzin in memory of Dr. Yeghia Taglyan. The church in the village of Berd underwent complete renovation due to the generosity of the late Diocesan benefactor John Stevens.

Lastly, with the active participation of Diocesan benefactors, more than a million dollars was raised for the Stewardship Fund of the Mother See of Holy Etchmiadzin. The funds will be allocated for the education, religious training and pastoral preparation of future clergymen of the Armenian Apostolic Church.

Academic Involvement – Schools & Universities

"We must make it our mission to instill in the hearts of the youth the unshakable Christian faith of our Church forefathers in order that they may walk alongside God and be immersed in His love."

For most of Armenian history, the Armenian Apostolic Church has been a vital source of education. Some of the most brilliant minds in Armenian history including St. Sahag, St. Mesrob, Movses of Khoren, Ananias of Shirak, David the Unbeatable, Gregory of Narek, St. Nerses the Graceful have been educated in the ancient Armenian monasteries which at the time served as educational centers.

The Western Diocese of the Armenian Church of North America continues educating the youth in efforts to preserve our Christian faith, our rich heritage and our identity in these distant shores.

The Diocese is actively engaged in the curriculum of five Armenian Schools. They include AGBU Manoogian-Demirdjian School, AGBU Vatche and Tamar Manoukian School, T.C.A. Arshag Dickranian School, Little Angels Art School and Alfred and Marguerite Hovsepian School. Religious courses are offered in the above mentioned schools. Diocesan Saturday and Sunday Schools also offer Armenian classes with a revised curriculum. On several occasions throughout the year, the Primate pays pastoral visits to the local schools where he meets with the students, faculty and PTO members.

In addition to the above grade schools, the Western Diocese has established relationships with the following universities: University of California Los Angeles, University of Southern California, Woodbury University, University of California Santa Barbara, University of California San Diego, and Claremont School of Theology.
